In conformity with the resolution of the House of Representatives of the 30th July, 1813, copies have been prepared at the Treasury, of the accounts in detail of the different Ministers Plenipotentiary, Envoys Extraordinary and Secretaries of Legation, and Consuls appointed under the authority of the U. States from the commencement of the present government; also accounts of the expenses incurred in the treaty with Algiers and the payments which have been made under that treaty; and accounts of all other expenditures in relation to the Barbary Powers, including those occasioned by the war with Tripoli, and the making of peace with that regency.
