LATEST FROM L. WELLINGTON'S ARMY.

A Commercial Friend has politely favoured us with the following extract of a letter dated New Bedford the 8th instant, which states: "An arrival there the night before from Lisbon, 46 days passage——The Captain of impressive effect. which vessel relates, that just before he sailed, Dispatches had arrived from Lord Wellington, announcing that he had gained a complete victory over Soult, after four days hard fighting. The Captain brought no papers that contain it, but the particulars which he states, are, that the battle began on the 11th Dec .- That Lord W. having dismissed and sent to Spain, a part of his Spanish and Portuguese Troops, because of their depredations upon the inhabitants; Soult seized the opportunity, marched out of Bayonne and attacked him; that in the first of the battle the French turned the left wing of Lord W's army, but it was corered by a body of British troops and regained its position—that the struggle continued until the 14th, when, having lost their artilleiv, and being attacked by the bayonet, they were compelled to retreat towards Bordeaux; Lord W. having thrown his army between them and Bayonne, and that he had pursued them 30 miles towards Bordeaux, which place it was expected he would enter."
