## WARREN.

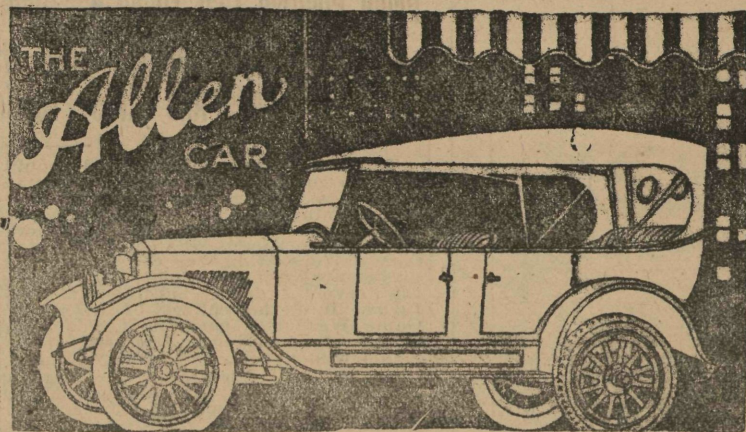
