ROCK CHAPEL.

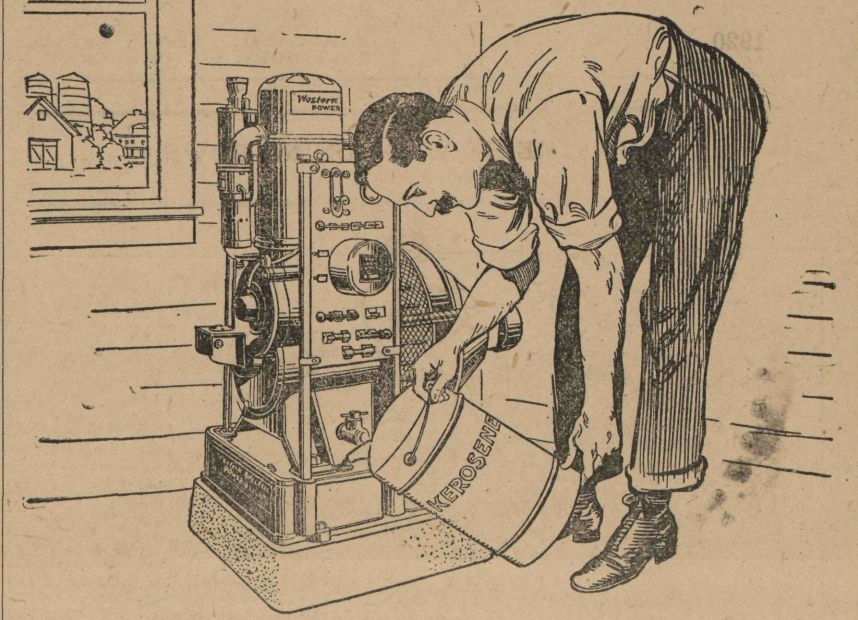
