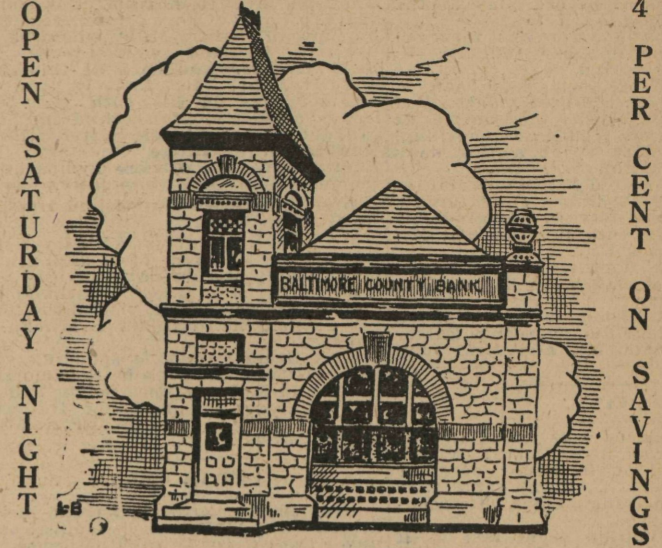
HAS HIM QUERIED
