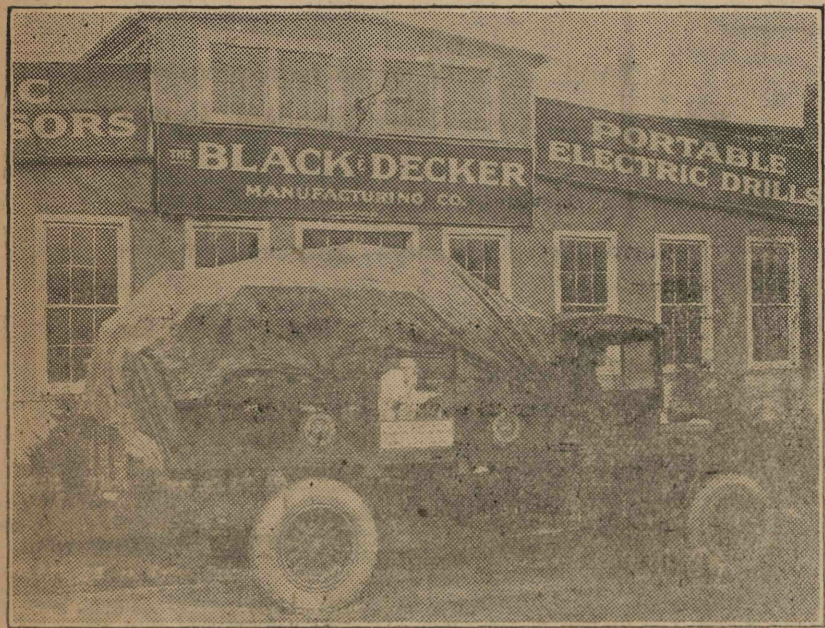

WILL COLLECT TWO-THIRDS

Commissioners And Treasurer Hold Conference Regarding Collection Of Special Tax.

On Tuesday last a conference was held by the County Commissioners and the County Treasurer, at which it was decided to collect under the tax levy for 1920 only two-thirds of the special tax levied on various town properties, such as Towson, Lutherville, etc. The County Commissioners levied a special tax of ten cents for Towson, Lutherville and the Twelfth district, and 20 cents for Landsdowns and Joshua.

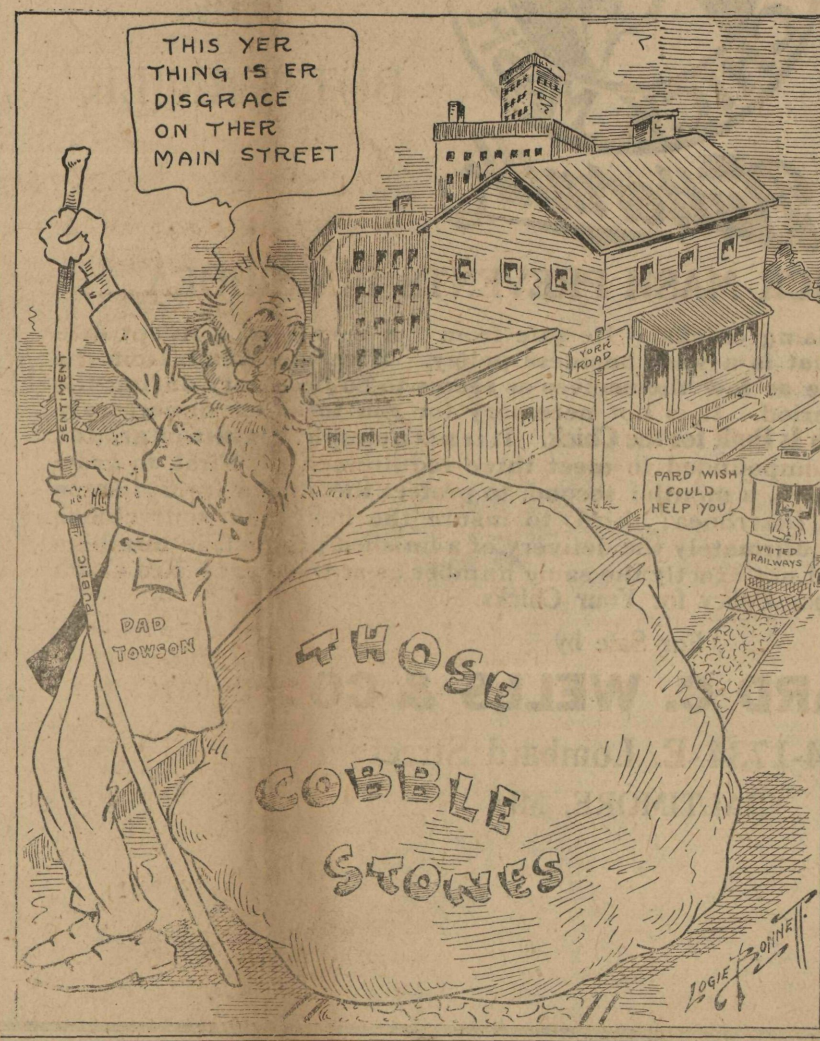
