Notice to Hotel Keepers and All Others Who Deal in Liquors. For the information of all persons concerned, the following Section 113 of Article 33 of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Elections," is published.

113. It shall be unlawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind on the day of any election hereinafter to be held in the several counties of this State; any person violating the provisions of this section shall be liable for indictment, and shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than fifty (\$50) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100) dollars for each offense; one-half of the fine shall be paid to the informer, and the other half to the County Commissioners for the use of public roads.

to tax stockmen by raising the cost of the grazing privileges 300 per cent after an increase of 100 per cent was agreed to last year. Democrats in the House saved them.

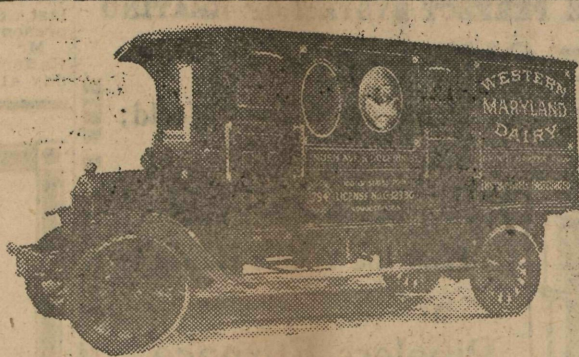

"Just at this time," came the answer (magnificently) "ever been' with him when he was alone."

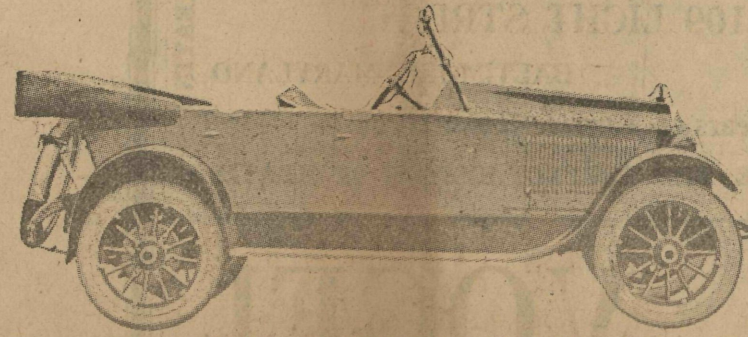

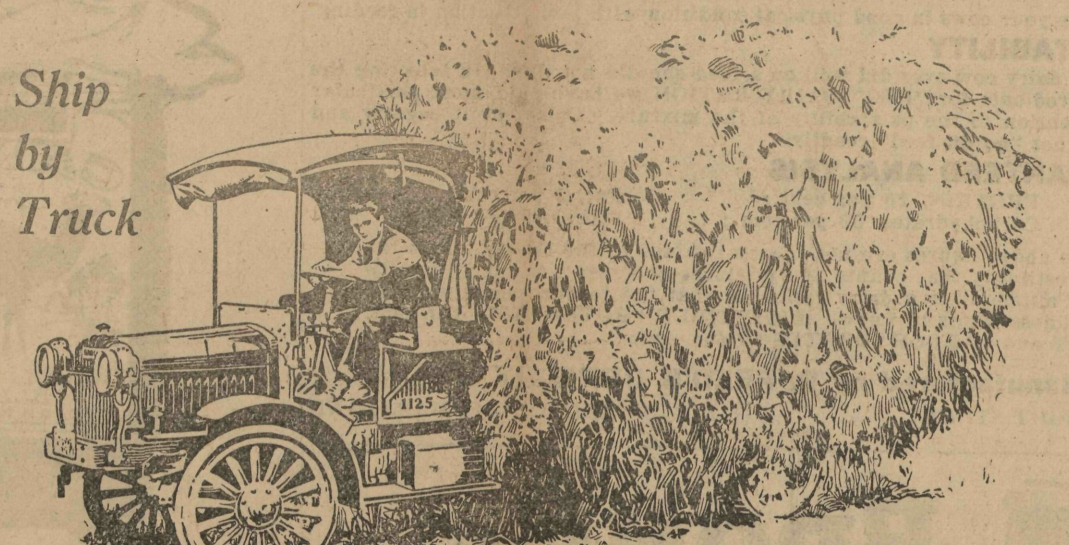

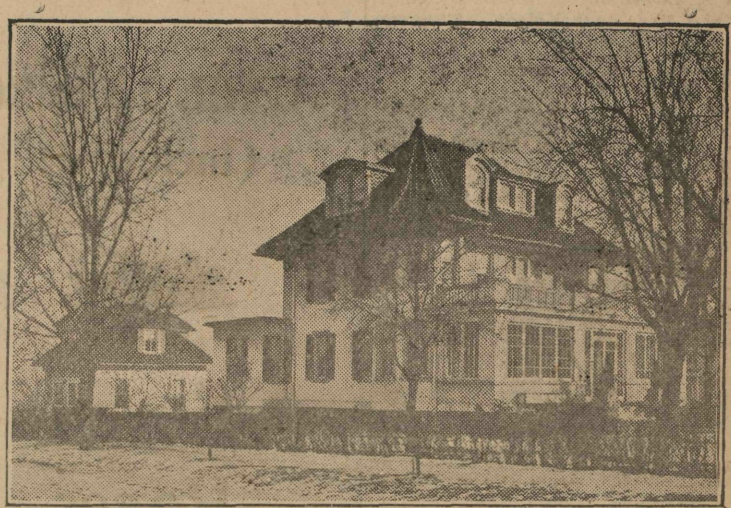
