Sunday School on Sunday morning as usual.

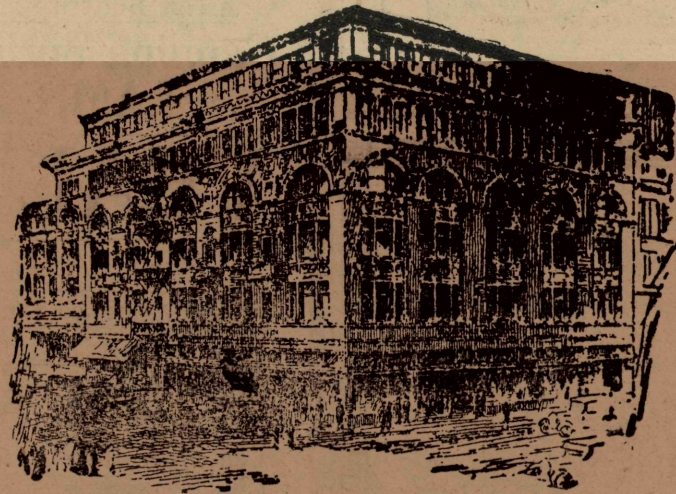
The children's day services will be held at Salem U. E. Church on June 13, at 7:30 P. M.
