## JUDGE BURKE.

Burke paid him Thursday night when

## THE PROPOSED NEW CHARTER.

All friends of good government in  
Baltimore County, regardless of their  
political faith, should give some con-  
sideration to the proposed new Charter  
for the County, recently submitted  
by the Charter Board to the County  
Commissioners, and which was pub-  
lished in full in The Jeffersonian and  
the local paper last week.

Every voter, before taking a posi-  
tion for or against the proposed char-  
ter, should make a careful study of its  
provisions, and consider whether the  
new form of government proposed, if  
adopted, would be any real improve-  
ment over the old. In other words,  
the charter should be judged on its  
merits, free from any purely political  
considerations.

The Jeffersonian shall from time to  
time discuss various provisions of the  
new proposed charter, in the hope of  
aiding the voters to arrive at a cor-  
rect decision on November 2, when it  
comes up for adoption or rejection.  
The County Commissioners authorized  
its publication but one time, and from  
investigation we find that few, if any,  
citizens read it, therefore The Jef-  
fersonian is contributing space this issue  
again to place the document before  
the people.

## CHAUTAUQUA.

The success of Chautauqua this ses-
