Quite a number of folks attended the Union Church service at the M. E. Church of Glyndon.

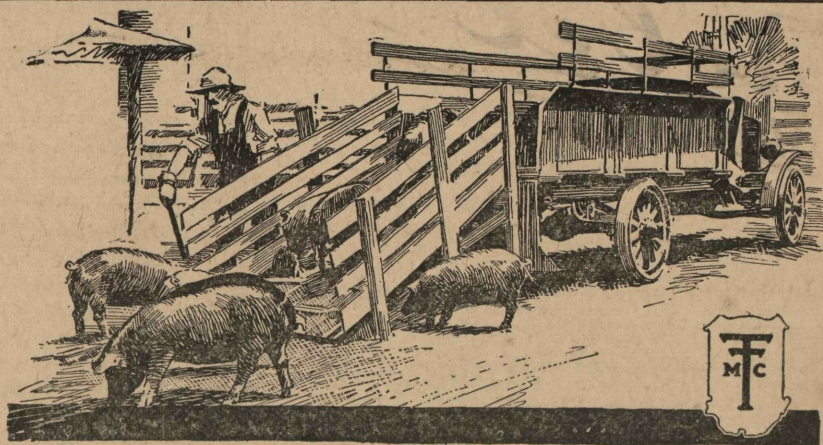

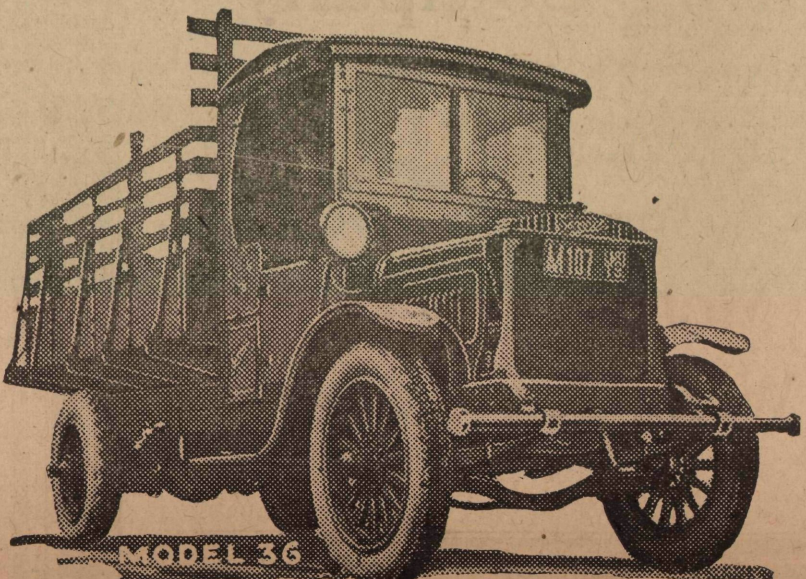
