WARREN.

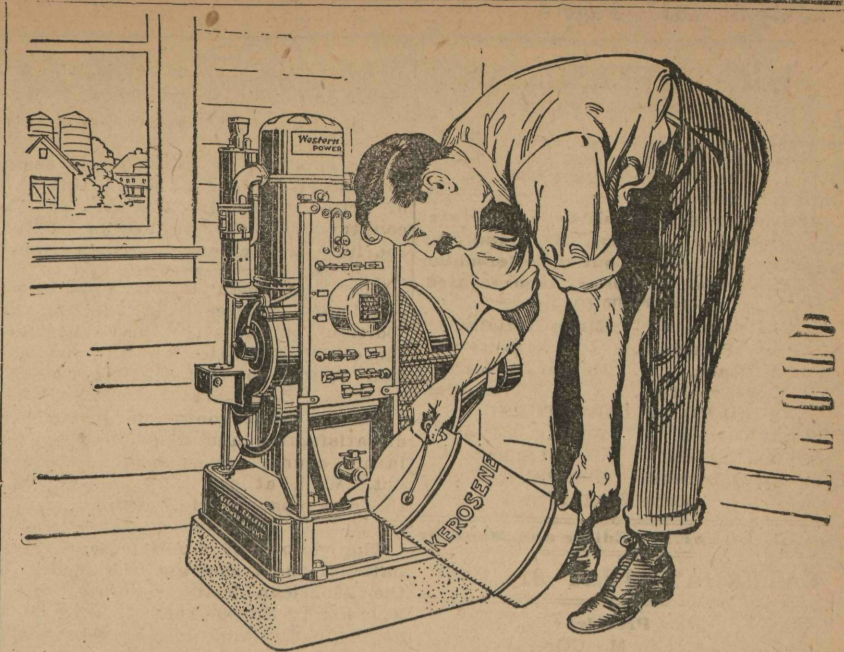
