**WORLD'S GREATEST WOMAN BILLIARD PLAYER**

Ruth McGinnis, of Honesdale, Pa., the world's greatest woman pocket billiard player, will appear at Brown & Cunningham's, Port Deposit, on Thursday, Feb. 20, at 7:00 p. m., and at Thos. S. Riale's, Rising Sun, the same evening, at 9:00 o'clock. This woman cue expert comes under the auspices of the National Billiard Association of America. Billiard fans will be given an opportunity to improve their game by taking advantage of the free instructions to be given by Miss McGinnis during her two hour exhibitions.

Miss McGinnis, who holds the world women's professional pocket billiards championship, is the lone feminine expert of the 21 cue ace who are now touring the country from one end to another on the N. B. A.'s third annual national "Better Billiards" program.

The feminine cue artist started playing billiards when a mere infant, and has also become adept at many other sports, being just under the expert class in fencing, swimming, track, golf, and baseball.

One of the oddities of her sports make-up is the fact that she is a southpaw—a rarity in billiards. Only four other left-handers have ever held billiard championships, namely: Augie Kleckhefer, Alfredo De Oro, Charles Ellis and Edouard Floremans.

Miss McGinnis is very attractive and possesses a pleasing personality. Highly educated, having recently taken a teacher's course at Pennsylvania State Teachers' College, she has a legion of friends among the billiard fans in the United States. She was a distinct "hit" on last year's "Better Billiards" program.

During the two hour exhibition, Miss McGinnis will meet all comers, display some fancy shots and offer free billiard instructions to both women and men.

**INCOME TAX RETURNS**  
Baltimore, Md.  
January 27, 1936

To Whom It May Concern:  
For the information and guidance of all taxpayers, and in accord with internal Revenue regulations, taxpayers are advised that the Commissioner of Internal Revenue desires all income tax returns to be filed on or before the due date, March 15, 1936.

Extensions for the filing of returns can and will be granted only in extremely meritorious cases. The reasons for extensions must be definitely stated and supported by the affidavit of the taxpayer before a Notary Public. Illness of such a nature as to make the return in time impossible for the taxpayer, and unavoidable absence from the State, will warrant extension.

Corporations are advised that if an extension is desired the request for the same must be made by some officer of the corporation, supported by an affidavit before a Notary Public.

Accountants are advised that any request for extension must be in fact the request of the taxpayer, and not the request of the accountant; and his request must be over the signature of the applicant and under affidavit, unless such signature for satisfactory reasons cannot be obtained, in which event, such request must be signed by a duly authorized
