

RESEARCH FINDS WAY TO KEEP PARASITES OUT OF FARM PROFITS

"Feeding worms and other parasites is almost as big an industry today as feeding livestock and poultry," says E. B. Powell, manager of the Purina Research Farm at Gray Summit, Mo.

According to Powell, much of the money that now goes to parasites can easily be turned into clear profits for the farmers of this country.

Dairy Expert Says Nature's Way Best in Growing Heifers

Once again there is an unusual amount of interest in growing out heifer calves. This has been brought about primarily through the higher prices dairy cows are bringing.

"Many dairymen give their heifer calves a good start," says W. R. Arends of the Dairy Department of the Purina Mills.

"The ultimate aim of any dairy farmer growing out heifers," says Arends, "should be to grow them and develop them fully before freshening time."

"Experiments run at the Purina Research Farm at Gray Summit, Mo., show that heifers can be grown out and fully developed and brought into production from two to three months earlier than the normal for the breed."

A recent bulletin, compiled by Purina Mills, tells of the plan worked out by the Purina Research Farm for developing calves into profitable first-calf heifers.
