> evenues. Revised estimates of the relief axes yield brought the total of the state's social security program up to next April to approximately \$7,650,-000. In addition to the \$3,550,000 n revenue from the program passed 500 surplus in the old-age pension account in the State Treasury. Federal and local contributions will

nake up the balance. A Federal contribution of \$2,000,-300 is expected for old-age pensions. Local political units of the State will ontribute another \$500,000. Also anticipated is a \$700,000 Federal grant for aid to dependent children and a \$200,000 contribution toward hanking the young people and hat program by the counties and

> Bond issues totaling \$1,000,000 for Allegany county and Cumberand for flood damage repairs were approved. The Mayor and City Council of Cumberland were authorized in one bill to issue \$500,000 in oonds to make repairs in the State's second largest city. The other \$500,000 issue authorized will be under the jurisdiction of the Board of County Commissioners for rehabilitation work outside Cumber-

> The fifth measure to receive the Governor's approval empowers the Board of County Commissioners of Allegany to issue \$60,000 in bonds each year through 1940 to liquidate the county's indebtedness to the State Roads Commission.

> By doing this, the county will not be deprived of current revenues from the gasoline taxes for maintenance and construction of roads. Otherwise, under a recently announced policy of the commission, the indebtedness would be amortized out of these current revenues due.

A bill passed on the suggestion of Attorney-General O'Conor was the seventh and final bill that became law. It creates avenues for reciprocal agreements with other States in the collection of inheritance and similar taxes on the estates of non-

resident decedents. The bill providing for a \$1,500,-000 State bond issue for repairs to bridges and State highways damaged by last month's flood was also signed.
