

EVERY PUP WILLING TO LEARN MANNERS

Ways to "House-Break," Feed and Care for New Family Pet Told by Expert.

There comes a time in almost every home when a puppy is added to round out the family. As the little stranger comes into the home, there's a right and a wrong way to introduce him to the family and make him feel at home. A. H. Leonard, well-known dog authority of the Purina Mills, passes along some "do's and don'ts" to be observed on the arrival of a new puppy.



"Strange surroundings and persons bewilder the newcomer," says Leonard, "so the first thing to do is to let him settle down quietly. Merely feed and water him and let him get his bearings. He shouldn't be stuffed with table scraps, greasy foods, meats, sweets and other things, but given a food suited for young pups. The puppy size dog food made in checker form is ideal for him. It gives him what he needs for growth and health.

"Right in the beginning puppies should be taught cleanliness in the house. Provide open newspapers for the young puppy, and insist upon their use at all time when indoors. Scold

the puppy for any violation. The entire floor may be covered with newspaper the first few nights. Then reduce the covered area to one newspaper pad, as he learns.

"After he gets the idea of the use of the paper without being reprimanded, place both puppy and paper outside after each meal, the last thing at night and the first thing in the morning. He will soon catch on and the job of house-breaking will be a thing of the past."

Easy to Get Pups to Mind

Training the pup is as simple as training a child, according to Leonard. It takes patience, a bit of common sense and reasonable understanding on your part. You'll find the little fellow more than willing to fall in line with you, thinking on obedience, cleanliness and general good behavior just as rapidly as he understands what you expect of him.

"One of the serious mistakes made in handling the new puppy," says Leonard, "is overfeeding him. Remember, he requires feeding, not filling. His meal time should be at regular hours. Teach him to clean up his plate at meal time and avoid feeding him in between meals. Whenever he fails to clean his plate, remove it as soon as he finishes. This will teach him to eat at regular hours and not walk away from his food and come back after it later."

RECKLESS DRIVING

What constitutes reckless driving? Many state policemen and traffic cops would no doubt have their own definition of that offense. But no one need take the definition of a mere traffic officer on reckless driving. The great U. S. Supreme Court in 1930 handed down its own definition which might be stretched to fit all cases of speeding and dangerous driving. In that decision the court said: "An automobile is, potentially, a dangerous instrumentality, as the appalling number of fatalities brought about every day by its operation bear distressing witness. To drive such an instrumentality thru the public streets of a city so recklessly as to endanger property and individuals is an act of such obvious depravity that to characterize it as a petty offense would be to shock the general moral sense. If such an act were to result in death of the offender would be subject to indictment for some form of felonious homicide. Such an act cannot be described otherwise than as a grave offense."

Are we preparing for peace or war? All present indications are for the latter. Larger appropriations for that purpose than ever before and the whole world in a terrible state of unrest and suspicion. Italy marching forward to victory on one side of the world and Japan keeping things moving in the Far East.

This week there is being launched in New York on Tuesday night and in Philadelphia on Thursday the Emergency Peace Campaign which is sponsored by the combined peace organizations of the country. The Rt. Hon. George Lansbury of England is to be in this country for a month and will speak in twenty different cities. Thinking people are terribly concerned about the situation and only an informed and determined public opinion can hold the war horses in check.

It was Martin Luther who said, "War is one of the greatest scourges of humanity; it destroys religion, the state, the family. In truth, all calamities are as nothing compared to war. How is it then that Christians make themselves brigands and robbers in the name of the Gospel? Do they really dare to call themselves followers of Jesus? Look at Jesus and St. Peter in the Garden of Gethsemane. Did not St. Peter believe that he was doing a good deed in defending his Master against those who were come to deliver him to the executioner? And did not Jesus reprimand him as a murderer for resisting with the sword? And did not Jesus himself on the cross pray for his persecutors?"
