LANGHORNE AUTO RACES

Langhorne, Pa., April 28-From the dirt track to the speedway move the nation's foremost knights of the Son comes from school with a big roaring road, Sunday, May 17, making their inaugural bow at Ralph A. Hankinson's Langhorne mecca of

eastern auto racing. In launching his sixth season as operator of the Langhorne speed plantation, Hankinson will feature the cream of Ameirca's racing talent. The various teams will play-and how? He already has made overture to outstanding western drivers who never before have raced in the East.

Ever since Hankinson's appearance on the scene in the role of promoter, Langhorne has enjoyed increasing popularity as the East's favored race course. Last year, an unprecedented crowd of 41,634 spectators witnessed the inaugural

Now recognized as the fastest mile circular course in the world, the Bucks county speedway is one of three remaining tracks of its kind in the United States. Indianapolis and Oakland are the only other speedways recognized by the high powers of American auto racing.

The whizzing tires and roaring motor of Kelly Petillo's Winfield charger last October inscribed a new world record for 100 miles at Langhorne. It was the outstanding feat of the season at this track, eclipsing 'Doc" Mackenzie's noteworthy performance—a 36-second mile—here in 1934.

Langhorne was the scene of four outstanding events in 1935. The late Johnny Hannon, 1934 Eastern monarch, won the inaugural; Ben Shaw followed suit in the second offering; Mackenzie flashed to triumph in the August classic, while Petillo annexed the 100-mile national championship race in October.
