PHILADELPHIA ROAD IMPROVEMENT

The State Roads Commission is about to advertise for bids for concrete paving of 9.25 miles of the new Philadelphia Road, between Aberdeen and the Baltimore City line.

The paving will consist of two twenty-foot concrete lanes separated by a thirty-foot parkway, in which shrubbery will be planted. The remaining 14.64 miles between the two municipalities will be stabilized, because the grading has not settled sufficiently for permanent paving.

This will consist of some temporary hard surfacing of gravel, stone or slag which will permit the operation of traffic over the road. An additional section of the road between Aberdeen and Havre de Grace is also to be permanently paved, a contract already having been let for the work.

PEDESTRIAN RUN DOWN BY AUTO

Ernest Harrigan, 50 years old, Cherry Hill, Cecil county, died as a result of injuries sustained when struck by an automobile driven by Charles C. Jackson, Elk Mills, Saturday night on Quality Hill, West Main Street, Newark, Del.

Harrigan was removed to the Homeopathic Hospital in the ambulance of the Aetna Hose and Ladder Fire Company of Newark. Police Hill of Newark started to investigate the accident but found it was outside Newark town limits and summoned Prides Leisure and Cochran of the state police. Harrigan was taken to the office of Dr. Wallace M. Johnson of Newark for first aid treatment. He died in the hospital of a fractured skull but also suffered other injuries.

Jackson, driver of the car which struck Harrigan, was taken before Magistrate Thompson and placed under \$2,000 bail on a charge of assault and battery.

The funeral of Mr. Harrigan was held Thursday afternoon, and interment made in Sharp's cemetery, Cherry Hill.


