MODERNIZATION LOANS

Baltimore City and every county in Maryland showed an increase in the number of modernization loans insured by the Federal Housing Administration during the two months from February 29 to April 30, according to Arthur E. Hungertord, State Director, National Emergency Council for Maryland. The total increase amounted to almost 25 per cent. This comparison is with the total of all such loans made in the preceding nineteen months.

In addition, was a growing increase month by month in the number of mortgages accepted for insurance.

In Cecil County 40 modernization loans amounting to \$18,829.28 were insured up to April 30. A total of four mortgages, either for the purchase of homes or the building of homes were accepted for the insurance in the county up to March 31. They total \$14,800.

The number of modernization loans for the entire State on April 30 had reached a total of 11,405 loans, amounting to \$4,792,379.37. The total number of mortgages accepted for insurance up to March 31, was 1,073, amounting to \$4,828,090.

"These figures show the possibilities of modernization loans and the insuring of mortgages for the purchase or building of homes," said Henry W. Webb, State Director, Federal Housing Administration. "Through these loans a great many men throughout the State are being given work."

A GIFT



from the Indians

WE ARE indebted to the Indians for many things. One of the chief of these is corn. For hundreds, perhaps thousands of years before Columbus took the grains of corn which were to spread its cultivation all over the world, the Indians had cultivated and eaten this important food. Just as we prize corn most highly, so did the Indians. Each year the six Indian tribes of the Iroquois family celebrated Green Corn Festival—four days of feast and thanksgiving to the Great Spirit who had given them corn.

To Show Our Gratitude

Housewives, today, carry on the festival, in a different way, however. Probably four days each week they serve corn in one way or another—roasting ears, corn puddings, corn salads, corn muffins, or in some other delightful form. Canners have varied the styles of canning corn in order to suit the tastes and convenience of housewives.

For example, when corn was first canned, it was almost all "cream style"—the rich creamy mixture which is especially fine for making cream soups, soufflés, corn puddings and chowders. In recent years, however, in order to meet the demand for new ways to serve corn, the "whole kernel" corn became available in cans. This corn is picked at "roasting ear" stage and the entire kernel is cut off and remains separate when in the can. It is particularly suited for sautéing, corn cakes, scalloped dishes, for stuffing peppers, for fritters, or for use in making a dressing for fowl. In 1934 one-fifth of the total pack of white corn was in this style.*

IN THE RED?

SOME say yes, some say no—economically speaking. Fashion promoters unanimously agree it's a season of reds. Walk down the avenue and see how many red coats you can count. Why not make your table fashionably red, and incidentally brighten up the red cheeks in your family, by serving lots of tomatoes this winter?

Gay and Good

Stewed Tomatoes and Mushrooms: Drain the liquor from one 4-ounce can of mushrooms and sauté the mushrooms gently in one tablespoon butter for three minutes. Add the contents of one No. 2 can of tomatoes, salt and paprika to taste, one bay leaf and one slice of onion. Stew gently for ten minutes. Remove the bay leaf and onion and serve with a triangle of toast on top of each serving. This serves six persons.

Scalloped Tomatoes and Peas: Mix the contents of one No. 2 can of tomatoes with three-fourths teaspoon salt, one tablespoon sugar and a few grains of pepper. Then put alternate layers of tomatoes, chopped peas (using one-half cup of peas in all) and grated cheese into a buttered baking dish. Cover the top with crumbs and bake in a hot oven, 400 degrees, for twenty-five minutes. This serves six persons.



Tomato Consommé: Mix the contents of one No. 2 can of tomato juice with two 10½-ounce cans of consommé. Bring to boiling. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Heat one-third cup of heavy cream. Pour the first mixture into the hot cream and serve at once, with croutons if desired. This serves six persons.*
