Schools Of County Reopen Sept. 2nd

New Granite High School For Elkton--Resignations And Appointments

The Board of Education met in regular session Tuesday, August 11th. Those present were Dr. T. B. Moore, President; Mr. Fred Lewis, Vice-President, and Mr. J. E. Crothers.

The minutes of the regular meeting of July 14th and special meeting of July 23rd were read and approved, and sundry bills ordered paid.

Letters were received from Mr. Leon Carroll and Rev. Henry Thomas asking permission for their children to attend high school in Kent County. The Board granted this permission and agreed to pay tuition for said colored children.

The Board then met with the County Commissioners and Architect, Mr. Ralph A. Jeffers, regarding the new Elkton High School. After some discussion, it was decided to construct this building of Port Deposit granite. The combined Boards agreed that the cost should not exceed \$200,000.

It was decided to reopen the white schools on September 2nd, preceded by a teachers' meeting on September 1st, and the colored schools on September 3rd, preceded by a teachers' meeting on September 2nd. The date for closing the schools was set at June 11, 1937.

The Board awarded the Western Maryland College scholarship to Mr. Frank Sherrard of Port Deposit, subject to Senatorial approval.

A request for the use of one room of the Charlestown School by the Charlestown Homemakers' Club was approved by the Board. The Board also granted the Club permission to wire the building with the understanding that an outlet would be provided in the room now being used for school purposes.

The proposed concrete walk at the Rising Sun High School was discussed and it was decided to have the work completed before the reopening of school. Dr. Moore was asked to take care of this project.

A letter was received from the State Roads Commission stating that their District Engineer was being instructed to release check for \$49.00 to the Board, thereby completing payment for the right of way on Bay View school property.

A letter was received from Mr. Howard May, Consultant Architect for the State Board of Education, approving the preliminary drawings for the Port Deposit Colored Elementary School. The Board directed the Superintendent to notify the Architect to proceed with the detailed specifications for the building.

Dr. R. M. Gregory of Wilmington, the only other person on the boat, escaped unharmed. A hole was stove in the bottom and the boat was sunk to extinguish the fire.

The boat was anchored in the river off the cottage at which Mr. Moseley was staying.

Dr. J. I. France Buys New Estate

Becomes Owner Of "Cloverland" Near Port Deposit

Dr. Joseph I. France, whose sale of famous Mount Ararat Farms was announced some time ago, has bought a new estate, and next spring will resume farming as the squire of Cloverland—a 300-acre tract on a hill overlooking the Susquehanna river just back of the town of Port Deposit.

"But it will be ordinary farming," he said. "I am not going back into the dairy business."

Until next March 25, when the Maryland farm year ends, however, he will remain at Mount Ararat, where he is associated, for the time being, with its new owner, Donaldson Brown, in the operation of the large dairy business established there by former Senator France.

The contract of sale was signed July 17, he said, but there are a few formalities yet to be observed before the sale is consummated and he can't take possession until spring.

The new place is about one and a half or two miles from the old one, as the crow flies. Mount Ararat is on a hill high over the Susquehanna, Tome School is on the next hill up the river, and Cloverland is on a third hill beyond the Tome campus.

It was formerly owned by the Head family, but its present owner is Mrs. Rebecca Murphy, a sister of former Senator John A. J. Creswell, who was Postmaster-General under President Grant.

A stone house that dates back to the Revolutionary War caps the hill-top and commands some delightful views of the river and surrounding country, Dr. France added. There also is an old tenant house and several outbuildings on the place. Some of the land is wooded but most of it is cleared and under cultivation.

OXFORD BOY OFF TO THE PHILIPPINES

Thomas E. Gillingham, Jr., a graduate of Oxford High School six years ago, is among four University of Arizona graduate students to sail August 18, from Portland, Ore., to associate with the Neilson mining interests in Manila, P. I.

Gillingham, a graduate from Harvard, received his master of science degree in geology at the University of Arizona this spring. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Gillingham, Oxford.

The addition of the four new Arizona engineers to the Neilson mines in the Philippines brings the total of University of Arizona graduates of recent years who have gone to mines in the islands to ten, it was said at the state institution's college of mines and engineering, which college was asked to supply the men.—Oxford News.

MILLWORK PLANT SOLD AT RECEIVER'S SALE

The entire plant and assets of the Oxford, Pa., Millwork Company were purchased at Receiver's sale by Wilard Ware, son of John Ware, Jr. The purchase price was \$5,000, plus the several liens against the property, which amount to approximately \$55,000.

While the assets of the company were appraised at \$122,000 without the real estate, there was no one who seemed willing to take over the business with the burden against it, and the purchase was made to protect the mortgage investment. No change in the method of operation is contemplated for the present.

Charges False Arrest And Brings Suit

Claims \$5000 Damages For Injuries To Character

Claiming \$5,000 damages for injuries to his character, Lee H. Rogers of upper Cecil county, through his counsel, Harold E. Cobourn, has filed suit in the Circuit Court at Elkton against Francis M. Keefer, Jr., individually, and Francis M. Keefer, Jr., assistant highway engineer of the State Roads Commission, and Homer E. Tabler, C. Nice Wilkinson and Frank F. Luthardt, members of the State Roads Commission of Maryland, as a result of his arrest some time ago, charging him with larceny of gasoline. He contends the charges were "utterly false and without foundation" and that he was vindicated. The plaintiff alleges the charges caused him to be imprisoned for 30 minutes and caused him to be subjected to ridicule of neighbors and friends.

The rest of the Reynolds estate is to be divided among his nieces and nephews, with the exception that Mrs. Price Hoopes, Mrs. Hugh Brown, Walter Reynolds, Mrs. Joseph Geiger and Ellis R. Tucker, "shall receive no part of my estate."

Tamargo, Jr. The Indians then took over the church and gave him his Indian name with tribal ceremonies. Mr. McDade dedicated the church and was accompanied on his visit by the Salvation Army Band from Wilmington.

Emergency Appropriation In State

Funds Allocated To Maryland Amount To \$53,770,694

Out of \$53,770,694.51 allocated to Maryland under the Emergency Appropriation Act of 1935, \$32,111,884.63 has been expended and \$49,761,836.14 has been obligated as of June 30, Arthur E. Hungerford, State Director of the National Emergency Council for Maryland, announces.

He explained that the amount expended was based on checks drawn, while the amount obligated consisted of actual and accruing liabilities incurred by project managers or by other authorized administrative officers.

When an expense is incurred the money to pay for it is set aside as obligated, Mr. Hungerford said.

"The unexpected balances on June 30 were \$21,658,809.88 and the unobligated balance was \$4,008,858.37.

"The greatest expenditure of funds in Maryland was made by the Works Progress Administration, amounting on June 30 to \$9,122,061.97. Its total obligations, however, were \$10,680,965.90.

"The necessities for meeting relief called for the expenditure of \$7,409,090.72 for the Federal Emergency Relief Administration. No obligations were outstanding.

"The CCC camps (emergency conservation work) spent \$7,150,188.13 in Maryland, with obligations amounting to \$8,500,000. The obligations include the amount spent.

"The Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works on June 30 had obligations in Maryland, including expenditures of \$3,643,861.55, amounting to \$11,775,077.40.

"For the various phases of Resettlement Administration work in Maryland, obligations amounted to \$5,935,259.16, of which \$2,609,623.81 actually had been spent.

"The obligations for roads, grade-crossing eliminations, amounted to \$3,479,444.79, of which \$413,877.97 has been actually spent.

"The Corps of Engineers, United States Army, has obligated for rivers and harbors work in Maryland \$95,594.51. It has spent \$70,388.41.

"The Agriculture Department has spent in Maryland \$158,734.77, including expenditures, the total obligations are \$173,069.19.

"Expenditure of all other Government agencies in Maryland amounted to \$1,534,057.36. The total obligations, including these expenditures, were \$1,713,334.47.

"These figures relate only to the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1935."

RUN DOWN BY NEGRO DOCTOR'S AUTO

Injured when struck by an auto on the Elkton-Perryville road Saturday night, W. H. Kerty, 60 years old, died several hours later in the Union Hospital. Dr. W. B. Butler, a Negro physician of Baltimore, driver of the car, took Kerty to the Union Hospital, Elkton.

He said the man, who had been in this vicinity for about a year doing painting jobs, walked directly in front of his car.
