In an exciting game, before a good crowd on the home diamond, the Hustlers topped Triumph Fusee by the score of 14-9, on Labor Day morning. Mike Brown again proved himself master of the mound, adding ten strike-outs to his week-end total. At the present time our high school enrollment is considerably smaller than last year's. There are twenty-four Seniors enrolled, fifty-one Juniors, fifty Sophomores and thirty-seven Freshmen.

The great difference between last year's enrollment takes place in the Freshman class. Last year we had over 60 pupils enter the first year class, while this year's class consists of only 37. The reason for this small Freshman class is not the fact that those finishing the elementary school did not go on to high school, for most of them did, but last year's seventh grade was a very small group. We expect our total enrollment to reach 180 pupils.

The Parent Teachers Association has purchased, for the use of the school, a new mimeograph. This machine is very much appreciated and will be very helpful for preparing lesson plans, test, programs, song sheets, etc.

There is only one change in the high school faculty: Miss Mary Tomlinson, of North East, takes the place of Mrs. Woodward as the teacher of Mathematics and coach of girls' athletics.

We are very proud of our new sidewalk which has recently been placed from the elementary school to the high school building. There has been a great need for this walk for some time.
