

GOLDSBOROUGH URGES COURSES ON WILDLIFE

Representative Also Favors Establishing Demonstration Station At U. Of Md.
(Washington Bureau of The Sun)
Washington, Feb. 28.—Representative T. Alan Goldsborough, of Maryland, has made a personal plea to the membership of the subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee considering the annual appropriation for the Biological Survey, to grant an increase in the funds for the bureau that would enable the establishment of a wildlife school and demonstration station at the University of Maryland, it was learned today.
The matter was first brought to the attention of Mr. Goldsborough by E. Lee LeCompte, Maryland State Game Warden for the past fifteen years who is also vice-chairman of the committee on wildlife.
The subcommittee considering the appropriations for the next fiscal year for the biological survey is headed by Representative Cannon (Dem., Mo.). Mr. Goldsborough said while the members of the committee did not commit themselves, his request was received cordially. Mr. LeCompte said such a station at the University of Maryland would be of great benefit to the State.

FEDERAL BIRTH REGISTRATION SURVEY TO BE CONDUCTED

The completeness of the registration of births in Maryland is to be tested in a survey to be conducted by the U. S. Bureau of the Census in cooperation with the State Department of Health, in two or more counties on the Eastern Shore. In announcing the plans for the survey, Dr. R. H. Riley, Director of the State Department of Health explained that it is preliminary to a more comprehensive campaign to obtain as close to 100 per cent registration in the State as it is possible to achieve. "Some areas in the State," he said "already have nearly complete registration; in others, notably the more rural sections, it is believed that the deficiency may prove to be as great as 10 per cent."
"Birth registration," he continued, "is assuming increasing importance year by year. The demand for information relative to birth certificates has been at least tripled during the last ten years. Copies of birth certificates are being demanded for such purposes as entry into school, for work permits, to establish the right to inheritances, to secure passports, to some extent to obtain automobile driver's licenses and for many other uses. The recent social security legislation is also making it more essential than ever for every child to be registered."
The Maryland survey has been planned and will be supervised, Dr. Riley said, on behalf of the Census Bureau by Dr. George Dobbs, acting in cooperation with Dr. A. W. Hedrich, Chief of the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Department of Health. Dr. John Collinson, who recently left the Department to become associated with the Federal Census Bureau assisted in planning and promoting the project.

JAPANESE BEETLE
Dr. Ernest N. Cory, State entomologist, described to growers and packers of canning crops the measures being taken to control the invasions of the Japanese beetle.
"All that is possible with the limited funds available is being done to postpone the day when the beetle will be a menace to the crops of the State as a whole," Dr. Cory said.
Although conditions were grave in Cecil county, he added, the invasion of the foliage-eating beetles has been checked in other sections of the State.
More than fifty growers and packers from seven states, on Wednesday, heard Dr. Cory's address at the opening session of a three-day canning crops conference sponsored by the Tri-State Packers' Association and the University of Maryland Extension Service.

LANDING FIELD PLANNED AT ABERDEEN

Project Approved By War Department—Funds Sought From WPA
Construction of an intermediate landing field near Aberdeen, Md., to cost approximately \$500,000, is considered possible as a WPA project. The War Department and the Department of Commerce have approved the project.
The matter has been pressed by Senator Tydings and Representative Cole for some time. The next step is to get an allotment of funds from the Works Progress Administration to carry it out.
Would Accommodate Seaplanes
Present plans call for hangars, ramps, and three runways each 3,000 feet long and 150 feet wide. The ramps proposed as a part of the field would permit seaplanes to land and take off from the field.
It would be located near Fort Hoyle, and on a direct course of the New York-Washington line, and would be of considerable value as an emergency landing field, it was pointed out.

He holds a position as baritone soloist at St. John's Episcopal Church, Worthington Valley. All three artists are active members of The Baltimore Music Club, where they have appeared on programs recently.

The matter will be taken up with the Appropriations Committee, Mr. Goldsborough stated, and later with the President.

The first assignment of fifty crates of twelve rabbits each, were shipped last week from Missouri for the Eastern Shore of Maryland. LeCompte said that fifteen crates went to Dorchester, thirteen to Wicomico, twelve to Worcester and ten to Harford. Rabbits for the other counties will follow in the near future.
