HOOK AND LINE FISHERMEN ORGANIZE

The "hook and line" fishermen of this county held a public meeting in the Court House, Elkton, Wednesday evening, May 5, at 8 o'clock, with the express purpose of forming an Anglers Club, to investigate the ponds and streams of this county, and find ways and means of stocking same.

The meeting was sponsored by Theodore Brown, of Rising Sun, one of Cecil county's most enthusiastic fishermen.

This county has for some unexplained reason been sorely neglected by the department in Maryland having charge of stocking and investigating the streams in this State. Almost every other county in the State has received its share of bass, pike, trout and other game fish, but outside of Conowingo Lake, Cecil county has been entirely left out of the State's Conservation program.

KENMORE HIGH SCHOOL

The Cecil County School Board is considering the advisability of changing the Kenmore High School, at Andora, and transferring all high school students to Elkton, after the completion of the new high school building in that town. The Kenmore school would be used as an elementary school.

INVITATION ATHLETIC MEET TO BE HELD MAY 15

High School Students From Eastern Shore Counties Will Participate State Teachers College Sponsors Movement

An athletic event of particular interest to high school students and their friends is the Invitation Athletic Meet to be held on the grounds of the State Teachers College at Salisbury on Saturday, May 15. The college, under whose auspices this first "Invitation Meet" is being held has sent announcements and entry blanks to the high schools in the Eastern Shore counties. From the interest being shown in this field and track event, the college athletic instructors, Miss Helen Jamart and Mr. Benn Maggs, expect many entries.

Representatives from the various high schools will compete for the large felt banner which the college will award the high school winning the greatest number of points. In addition to the prize for the school, Miss Jamart and Mr. Maggs, who are in charge of the meet, announce that badges will be given to the first, the second, and the third place winners in each event.

In order to give high schools having a small enrollment an even chance with those having a large enrollment, the following regulations have been agreed upon: a high school may not enter more than 20 individual girls, and 20 individual boys in the meet; a girl may be entered in 1 field event, 1 track event, and in volleyball; a boy may be entered in 1 track event, 1 field event, and in 1 speed ball; it is understood that substitutions may be allowed upon the presentation of an authentic excuse. Weights are not considered for eligibility in any events.

Events for the girls are: run and catch relay, 50 yard dash; broad jump, high jump, volley ball. The men's events are listed as: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, 880 yard run; medley relay, speed ball, pole vault, discus, javelin, running broad jump, running high jump, shot put.

HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE TEACHERS MEET

The teachers of sciences in the Cecil County high schools are engaged in a series of conferences relative to the improvement of their work. At recent meetings there was developed a statement of the general purposes of the teaching of science in our high schools. The "purposes", subject to criticism by the Supervisor of High Schools, are as follows:

1. Building up and understanding general ideas about our environment.
 2. Development of the pupil's ability to think.
 3. Changes in the actions of the pupils.
 4. Development of definite attitudes, interests, and appreciations.
 5. Enriching the pupil's outlook on life.
- The newest project of the group is a reorganization of the teaching of General Science with a view to introducing an advanced course in the subject. This new course would be offered in the third or fourth year to pupils who are working for a diploma in the General Course.
- There is a possibility that these meetings will lead to a permanent organization of the Cecil County science teachers for the mutual benefit of the members.

ELKTON MARRIAGE MART

During the month of April, the records at the office of the Clerk of the Court show that there were 812 marriage licenses issued, compared with 758 during the corresponding month last year. Under the terms of a law passed by the Maryland Legislature, on and after June 1, couples must make applications 48 hours prior to the time a marriage license may be issued. This law, it is believed, will practically put an end to out-of-the-state couples coming to Elkton to procure the necessary legal permits to wed.

Taylor, of Conowingo, widely-known superintendent of the Susquehanna Power Company, died at the Maryland General Hospital, Baltimore, on Tuesday, April 27, following an illness of about four weeks' duration. He was born fifty-five years ago in England and came to the United States at the age of sixteen. He had been in the employ of the Philadelphia Electric Company for twenty-one years, and for the past twelve years had been station superintendent at the Conowingo electric plant.

Mr. Taylor was vice-president and treasurer at various times of the Bel Air Rotary Club, was a past master of Excelsior Lodge No. 491, member of Signet Royal Arch Chapter No. 251 and was an active member of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, American Society of Mechanical Engineers, Pennsylvania Electric Association, Edison Electric Institute and was an active member of Grace Memorial Protestant church of Darlington.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Sarah J. Taylor, he is survived by one daughter, Miss F. Eleanor Taylor, one son, Mr. Roger S. Taylor of Ardmore, Pa.; one grandson, Roger S. Taylor, Jr., His mother, Mrs. Mary Taylor of Philadelphia, and three brothers and two sisters, also survive.

Funeral services were held at 11 o'clock Saturday, at Grace Memorial Church, Darlington, the Rev. Kenneth Albaugh officiating. Interment was made in West Laurel cemetery, Philadelphia.
