Deakin & Coleman, owners of that fine Jersey herd, leads the association again for the last time, since they are leaving the association, and are entering their herd on the Jersey Herd Test. Their average per cow for the month of May was 891 lbs. of milk and 42.6 lbs. of butterfat.

Second place was taken by another purebred Jersey herd, that of Ennis McGrady's with an average of 734 lbs. of milk and 35.7 lbs. of butterfat per cow.

John Lippincott's, purebred Jersey's were third, with 694 lbs. of milk and 35.4 pounds of butterfat.

Competition seems to be very close; fourth place was filled by Everett England's Guernseys with 709 lbs. of milk and 35.1 lbs. of butterfat; purebred Holstein owned by Wickes Davis took fifth and last place, with 957 lbs. of milk and 33.7 lbs. of butterfat.

Holly Hall Farms Own High Cow

Holly Hall Farms steps in to fill some positions with individual high cows. The first high cow, a grade Guernsey No. 98831, produced 1271 lbs. of milk, and 76.3 lbs. of butterfat for the month. Holly Hall also had second and fifth high cows which were also Guernseys.

F. S. Brown's Guernsey "Rachel" was third high cow with 1398 lbs. of milk and 65.7 lbs. of butterfat.

Fourth place was tied by Wickes Davis purebred Holstein No. 3, and Piney Creek Farm's purebred Jersey No. 14, both producing 64.4 lbs. of butterfat for the month.

John Kimble's Grade Holstein produced 1894 lbs. of milk and 62.5 lbs. of butterfat to fill sixth place.

L. Wickes Davis also took seventh place with another purebred Holstein No. 19.

Nine, tenth and last places were held by two of H. B. Crowe & Son's purebred Jerseys.

It is interesting to note that the last cow of the high ten cows was not below 60 lbs. of butterfat.
