

Social Security Claimant Forms

Baltimore, Dec. 10—Simple claim forms have been provided by the Social Security Board for the rapidly increasing number of claimants for old age insurance lump-sum payments, Luther Becker, Manager of the Baltimore Field Office of the Board said today.

Evidence of growing realization that the Board is making lump-sum payments now under the old-age insurance system established by the Social Security Act is to be found in a comparison of the number of claims filed during the last three months in Region IV, comprising Maryland, the District of Columbia, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Mr. Becker said.

There were 307 claims filed in September, 672 in October and 1,012 filed during November.

Located at 300 Court Square Building, the Baltimore office serves the counties of Harford, Cecil, Howard, Baltimore, and Anne Arundel, as well as Baltimore City. Residents of Baltimore City and these counties should apply at the office for claims forms and assistance and information about lump-sum payments, it was stated.

Supplies of claims forms will be furnished employers who may wish to have them to aid their employees who reached 65 or the relatives of employees who die, it was said.

"Not only have the forms been made as simple as possible to aid the claimants, but the Board has devised a separate form for each class of claimant for a lump-sum payment," Mr. Becker said. "There is a form for the wage-earner himself, that is, the employee who has reached 65 years of age since last January 1 and wishes to file a claim for the old age insurance lump-sum payment which may be due him."

"Another simple form has been prepared for the use of the widow or widower of the eligible worker who has died since last December 31. A third form has been prepared for the use of close relatives of a deceased worker, other than the widow or widower. A fourth claim form has been prepared for the use of executors and administrators of estates and a fifth for the use of guardians or committees."

"No fee is charged by the Social Security Board for receiving a claim and every assistance will be given by the Baltimore Field Office to those who wish to file a claim for the lump-sum payment which may be due them."

"Although the number of claims filed in this area is increasing, it appears there still are many persons eligible for lump-sum payments who are not aware of the fact and have not filed claims. It should be pointed out that no lump-sum payment can be made by the board unless a claim is filed."

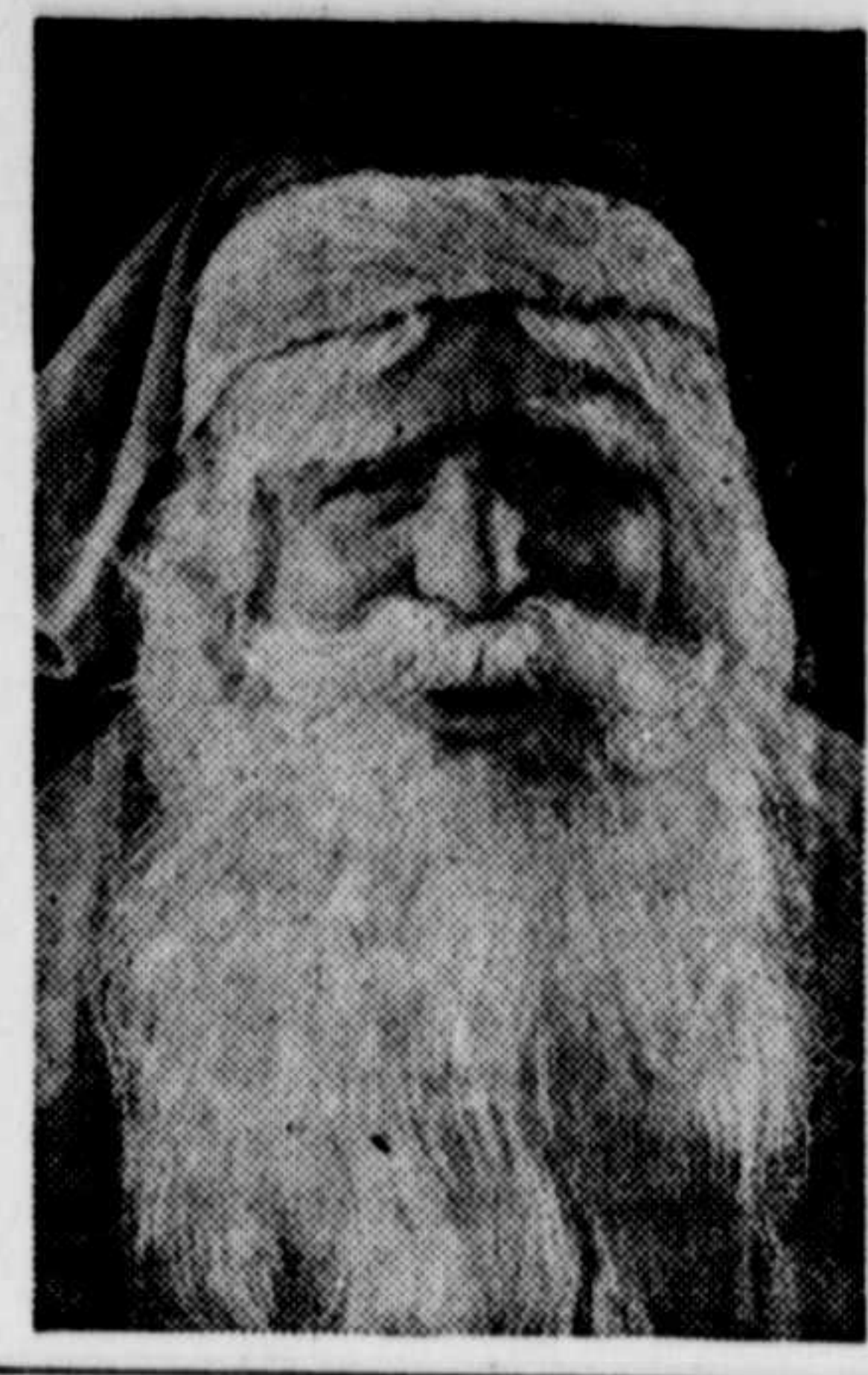
