September Meeting Held At Home Of Mr. And Mrs. Howard E. England

Club met with Mr. and Mrs. Howard E. England, Wednesday, September 7.

Mr. W. R. Little called the meeting to order after which the roll was called and showed several members absent. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

H. R. Brown was appointed treasurer to fill out the balance of the year, caused by the death of Mr. J. E. Reynolds who had served as treasurer for a number of years.

Mrs. Atlee Armer, Mrs. Charles F. Miller and Mrs. Charles H. Morris were appointed on resolutions committee.

Mr. E. England had put lime on ground for sweet clover. It was very much larger than a small piece where he did not put lime on.

Mr. T. K. McDowell had plowed down oats for late potatoes found that a good plan.

Mr. H. R. Brown had planted oats with soy beans but oats had nearly smothered out the beans.

Mr. William England had mowed alfalfa too late last fall and did not have much this year.

Mr. D. B. McDowell told of having seen a patch of soy beans, part had been inoculated and were about twice as tall as the one inoculated.

Mr. J. B. Fassitt spoke about the beetle getting into the corn.

Mr. T. K. McDowell had brought three ears of corn with him showing the work of the beetle, and explaining some things about corn and selection for seed.

Mrs. Miller told something of a trip they had this summer, going as far South as Tennessee.

Mrs. Atlee Armer opened the program with a reading by Mrs. T. K. McDowell.

Dinner being announced, J. B. Fassitt, D. B. McDowell and E. England were appointed on the inspection committee.

Mrs. Charles Morris said the blessing.

After a very pleasant social hour club convened.

Mrs. Fassitt gave reports.

Mrs. Armer and Mrs. McDowell gave readings.

Mr. J. Z. Miller introduced Mr. John B. Cotton who showed pictures on Soil Conservation and how to hinder the washes.

Mrs. Patterson of Oxford told of her trip up through New York State. Club adjourned to meet with Mr. C. C. England in October.

Jobs Filled In State

The number of jobs filled by the fourteen offices of the Maryland State Employment Service with private employers took a sudden jump last week to 508. The previous week's figures was only 353.

This high satisfactory increase was due almost entirely to the better reports from the office in Baltimore City, where 274 jobs were filled for private employers last week as against only 191 the previous week. Elsewhere, business continued at about the same level as that reported during the first full week of September.

The office in Hagerstown showed a jump from 25 to 62 jobs filled with private employers during the last week, as compared with the previous one; and in Salisbury the figure more than doubled itself by jumping from 8 private jobs filled during the first week to 17 last week. In Towson the increase was almost as great, the figure jumping from 9 to 16.

Filling jobs for public contractors continued to demand considerable time from the staff, and the week's end showed a total of 133 such jobs filled during the week. Most of this activity was carried on in Rockville, Salisbury, and Westminster. Between them, these three offices made 74 placements to public works projects, or well over half the state total.

Taken altogether, the fourteen offices of the Service filled 641 jobs during the week, which is a very gratifying increase over the previous week's total of 480.

Commenting on this fact, Mr. D. L. E. B. Fringer, Director of the Service, said: "The first ten days of September failed to show the usual seasonal pick-up in business that we normally expect. But last week was more encouraging and I hope that the rest of the month will continue to show improvement."

O'Connor Wins Democratic Nomination

The nomination of Herbert R. O'Connor for governor on the third ballot at Wednesday's Democratic convention, was assured Monday night, fifteen days after the primary election was held.

Prince George's county's seven delegates will swing behind Attorney General O'Connor as soon as they reach the "uninstructed" status.

This announcement was made by Senate President Lansdale C. Sasser, who holds the Prince George's delegation on the first ballot.

The long and bitter wrangle between Mayor Jackson, of Baltimore, and Mr. O'Connor, was ended, by Senator Sasser's announcement.

New Dual Highway Link

Plans for the first link of the dual highway, from the Susquehanna River to the Delaware State line, which will be a 2.4 miles section between Elkton and Glasgow, Delaware, called for a dual concrete road with 22-foot lanes and a 50-foot central grass parkway. The road will be wider than the Governor Nice highway between Havre de Grace and Baltimore, which only has a 30-foot central parkway. Starting at the Delaware line, the new road will follow the route of the present road westward for approximately a mile, and the existing roadbed will be used for the northward lane.

It is proposed to cross the Elk river a half-mile south of Elkton. The route will by-pass the town of Elkton. The first contract will end at the junction of the Elkton-Chesapeake City road below Holly Hall. Sections between Elkton and Perryville to connect with the highway already built will be started later.

One Hundred Per Cent Placement

With the recent employment of Miss Irma Brittingham as teacher in Talbot County, one hundred per cent of the 1938 class at the Salisbury State Teachers College have been placed. This one hundred per cent placement has, apparently, had an effect on the enrollment, since the enrollment for 1938-39 is already 234, as compared with 210 a year ago. This number represents the history of the college. Of this number, 80 are young men and 154 young women. A total of 104 freshmen, 40 young men and 64 young women, have enrolled, thereby exceeding the 1938-39 goal of 100. Sixty-two sophomores, 27 juniors, 37 seniors, and 4 special students have registered.

Gov. Nice Mentioned For U. S. Senate

Drew Pearson, in his "Maryland Merry-Go-Round" column is responsible for the following bit of political news:

"There is a quiet movement on foot on the part of certain highly placed people in Washington to get Harry Nice to switch from the gubernatorial to the Senate race.

"How far it will get depends largely on the Governor himself. He seems to think that he has an excellent chance of coming back to Annapolis, that friction between the O'Connor-Jackson groups will bring a big vote for the Republican ticket."

Work On C. & D. Canal Halted

The improvement work on the Chesapeake & Delaware canal, which is being widened to 250 feet and being made a depth of 27 feet is a standstill, due to the failure of Congress to grant a request of the War Department for \$600,000 to complete the undertaking, on which \$13,000,000 already has been expended. No further work can be undertaken until after Congress convenes in January.

September Term Of Circuit Court

Cases Before Court---Sentences Imposed On Those Found Guilty

Wibert Fulkner, colored, employed by John Duncan, of near Lombard, was found guilty of stealing a watch and ring from his employer and sentenced to nine months in the Maryland Penitentiary.

Burl Miller of near Rising Sun was found guilty of an assault on Brown Janney, also of Rising Sun.

During a drunken brawl at the Blue and White road house, just east of Rising Sun, Janney was stabbed by Miller.

Ireland Moore, colored, of near Liberty Grove, was found guilty by a jury of placing cross ties on the tracks of the Octoraro Branch of the Pennsylvania railroad last summer. The obstruction was discovered by a school girl on her way to the Liberty Grove school. The case was reported to the railroad detectives who testified that Moore placed the ties there and intended to report the obstruction with hope of reward. The verdict carried recommended the mercy of the Court.

Walter Mowery, charged with operating a motor car while under the influence of liquor also with reckless driving, pleaded not guilty. Acquitted of the first charge and found guilty of reckless driving. Fined \$50 and cost.

George Braywood, colored, tried before the Court on larceny charge. Verdict guilty. Sentenced to one year in House of Correction.

Wilbert S. Calvert, charged with larceny. Confessed guilty. Sentence suspended upon payment of costs.

Harry Sexton of Hightown, N. J., was found guilty of bigamy. He married the second time in Elkton with a wife still living from whom no divorce had been obtained. He pleaded guilty and was given two years in the Penitentiary.

Michael Rutowski, charged with larceny. Pleaded guilty. Sentenced to four months in House of Correction.

Charles Collins, a young white man of North East section, whose car collided with a machine driven by Senator Harold E. Cobourn, of Perryville, on the Elkton-North East road, on the night of June 5th last, resulting in the death of Senator Cobourn, was placed on trail Thursday afternoon. He is charged with manslaughter. It is alleged that Collins was under the influence of liquor while he was driving his car when the accident occurred.

Collins was acquitted and the case dismissed.

Cecil Native Storm Victim

Relatives in Cecil county have been informed that Mr. and Mrs. Charles Garroll of Hammett Point, Conn., were two of the victims who lost their lives in the storm that swept the New England States, last week.

Mrs. Garroll was formerly Miss Minnie Ash, daughter of the late Joshua Ash of Elkton. She first married Charles White, son of the late Sheriff Clinton J. White, of Elkton, who moved to Connecticut, shortly thereafter. Later, she was married to Charles Garroll, and they had resided at Hammett Point, Conn., for the past 15 years. Mrs. Garroll has a number of relatives in Cecil.

Repairing Old High School Building

Work of repairing the old high school building in Elkton to get the building in shape for a temporary court house was begun this week. Plans have been made by the County Commissioners to raze the present building and to erect a much larger and up-to-date court house building on the same site. It probably will take a year to complete the work. The new building will cost in the neighborhood of \$250,000 and will be a WPA project.

Hit And Run Driver Held

Paul Varnaby of Washington, D. C., has been placed under arrest, charged with having been the driver of the car that struck and killed Harry Robertson, aged 37 years, on the night of Sept. 19. Robertson was employed on the farm of J. Famous Ham, east of town. He is held under \$1,000 bail for action of the September Grand Jury for Cecil County.

Robert Johnson, of Montgomery county and son of "The Big Train" Johnson, was awarded a gold medal for placing first in 4-H Club stock judging contests at Maryland State Fair this year.
