### PUBLIC GENERAL LAW

CHAPTER 448  
AN ACT to repeal and re-enact with amendments Section 209A of Article 56 of the Annotated Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, 1935 Supplement, as such section was amended by Chapter 193 of the Acts of 1937, Regular Session, title "Licenses," sub-title "Motor Vehicles," sub-heading "Rules of the Road," to require school busses operating throughout the State to carry a special design and color, to limit the speed of school busses, to require school busses to carry a fire extinguisher, to require school busses to have an emergency rear door, to require vehicles to stop in front of and behind said school busses operating throughout the State, to prohibit the use of vehicles marked as school busses when not actually used as such, to require inspection of school busses, to exempt from the operation of certain portions of this Act cities and towns of more than five thousand population, and to provide penalties for violation hereof.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Section 209A of Article 56 of the Annotated Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, 1935 Supplement, as such section was amended by chapter 193 of the Acts of 1937, Regular Session, title "Licenses," sub-title "Motor Vehicles," sub-heading "Rules of the Road," be and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted, with amendments, to read as follows:  
209A. 1. Definition: The term "school bus" as used in this Act shall be defined as a motor vehicle having a seating capacity of ten or more persons and transporting children to and from the elementary and/or high schools in the State and not operating under the jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission and/or not operated by a public service corporation furnishing mass transportation in a town of a population of more than 50,000 inhabitants.

2. Every vehicle when used as a school bus shall have both on the front and on the rear a plainly visible containing the words "school bus" in letters not less than four inches in height, with each stroke of not less than half an inch in width; such school bus shall also be equipped with stop signals visible both from the front and rear, and the body of such school bus shall be painted orange and black; with the orange color predominating. The commissioner of Motor Vehicles is empowered to adopt rules and regulations, not inconsistent with this Article, relative to such school bus signs and stop signals.

3. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of a city or town of incorporated cities and towns of more than five thousand population, upon meeting or overtaking any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school child or children, shall come to a full stop at least ten (10) feet from such school bus, either in front or rear thereof as the case may be, and such vehicle shall remain standing until the children are received or discharged and the school bus has again started. The foregoing shall be applicable only in the event the school bus is equipped with the school bus signs and stop signals and painted in the color scheme as prescribed in this Act, shall not apply to vehicles approaching such school bus from the front on dual highways.

4. No school bus operating in the State while it is carrying any passengers to or from school shall be operated at a rate of speed greater than 35 miles per hour.

5. Every school bus operating within the State shall be equipped with a fire extinguisher which bears the label of approval of the Fire Underwriters' Association and which shall be kept properly filled and in satisfactory operating condition at all times. This extinguisher shall be placed in the school bus in a location readily accessible to the driver.

6. Every school bus operating in this State shall have a door in or near the rear of the bus readily accessible for the discharging of pupils in case of emergency. The rear bumper shall be so placed that it will not interfere with the egress of the passengers using the emergency door. The door shall be controlled by a safety device which in case of emergency may easily be operated independently of the driver and the device shall be protected against accidental or unauthorized release.

7. Every school bus operating in the State shall be required to come to a full stop within at least 10 feet and not more than 50 feet before crossing at grade any track or tracks of a railroad.

8. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or permit to be operated any motor vehicle with the words "school bus" painted or printed thereon if such bus is not more or less regularly used as a bus for the transportation of children to and from school.

9. Every school bus transporting children to public schools in each county shall be inspected at least twice each year. Such inspection shall be made by the county superintendent of schools or his duly authorized agent, assisted by a person to be designated by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles. One of the two inspections mentioned above shall be made during the month of September.

10. Any person operating a motor vehicle which fails to stop as required in Sub-Section 3 of this section, when a school bus, with the stop signal set, stops to take on or discharge children, or who otherwise violates the provisions of this section when such bus actually halts for the purpose of taking on or discharging children, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00). Furthermore, any school bus owner or operator permitting such school bus to be operated which does not meet the regulations mentioned in this section or which violates any other provision of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect September 1, 1939.
