



OLIN R. HIGGINS

Olin R. Higgins, of Hurlock, Dorchester county, Md., prominent in the agricultural interests of his county and the Shore and a former Senator from that county in the Maryland State Legislature, has announced his candidacy for nomination as Representative in the United States Congress from the First Congressional District.

Prominently mentioned on previous occasions as a likely candidate for the post, and assured of the support of many of the leading Democrats of Dorchester county, Mr. Higgins has gained a Shore-wide following of enthusiastic supporters.

Mr. Higgins served in the Maryland Senate from 1934 to 1938, at which time he was not a candidate for re-election. His record in the State Legislature was a distinguished one and his work there was of lasting benefit to his county and his State. As Chairman of the important Committee on the Chesapeake Bay and Tributaries, he steadfastly stood for the interests of the watermen and for legislation that would benefit those interests. He served also on other important committees, including those on Finance and Agriculture, and was a member of all conference committees for discussing and adjusting differences between the Senate and House of Delegates.

Under the present State Administration he was appointed by Governor O'Connor to serve on his advisory committee to study Revenue and Sources of Revenue, and was appointed by the Governor to serve on a three man commission to recommend by July 1, 1940, a program for improved transportation across the Chesapeake Bay. This latter report is to be submitted to the next session of the General Assembly.

He is extensively interested in agriculture and is the owner of large orchards near his home in Hurlock. Besides his farming interests, he is engaged in a farmers' supply business and owns and operates an Interstate trucking company. He is a member of the Farm Bureau, a former president of the Peninsula Horticultural Society of which he is at present a director, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Maryland State Horticultural Society.

He has for many years been especially interested in the public school system and was the first president of the Dorchester County Parent-Teachers Association and the first president of the Hurlock Parent-Teachers Association. In 1924 he was appointed by the late Governor Ritchie as a member of the Dorchester County School Board, where his services proved to be of great value, and where he contributed much toward the improvement of the county school system.
