Also to vote for or rejection of the following Constitutional Amendments, Chapters 40, 163, 200, 247, 371, 381, and 771 of the Acts of 1939, and referendum, Chapters 353 and 732 of the Acts of 1939.

The polls will be opened in each and every election district and precinct of said County at 7 o'clock A. M., and will be closed at 7 o'clock P. M., at which time the ballots will be publicly counted.

WILL SET UP FLOWER SEED FUND

Thousands of Maryland school children would be given the opportunity to cultivate and appreciate flowers during the next 20 years, as the result of an unusual bequest in a will filed for probate in the Cecil County Orphans' Court.

A fund of \$4,000 established under the will of William Steel of Port Deposit, would be used to buy flower seed for the school children of Cecil and Baltimore counties and also the city of Baltimore, over a period of two decades.

Stipulating the \$4,000 sum be invested for a Flower Seed Fund, in memory of his wife, and the interest be used for the purchase and distribution of flower seed, the Steel will appoints as executors the Rev. Dr. S. J. Venable of West Nottingham Presbyterian Church, the Rev. R. H. Hoover of the Perryville Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Kenneth E. Walter of Port Deposit, Prof. J. Paul Slaybaugh, headmaster of West Nottingham Academy, and Pierre N. LeBrun, vice-president of the Cecil National Bank of Port Deposit.

The estate, valued at about \$40,000 is to be incorporated as "The Hugh and Hannah Steel Foundation," in memory of his parents.

Twelve minutes after the will is probated, the executors are empowered to have incorporated a "charitable, beneficial, and educational corporation, under Maryland laws, with perpetual existence."

The Foundation, which is charged with investing the funds and managing the bequests, is to operate for a period of 50 years. If, at that time, the will states, the foundation is found impracticable or unnecessary, it shall cease and the estate be divided between Lafayette College, West Nottingham Academy, and Johns Hopkins University.

Other bequests, to be handled by the Foundation provide that his sister, Margaret Steel and his nephew, S. Hrsmon, both of Gilroy, Calif., be paid the sum of \$400 each. The will also provides that should his sister contest the will, her bequest shall cease.

The Foundation is to pay annually to the Port Deposit Presbyterian Church an amount equal to its yearly contribution to said church. Mr. Steel directed that Rockland Farm, near Port Deposit, his most valued real estate, shall not be sold for a period of five years.

Compensation of the Foundation managers shall not be less than three per cent annually of the income and equally divided, and in the event of a vacancy among the managers, such places shall be filled by persons holding the same positions in the same institutions they now represent.

Officers of the Foundation are to be: President, Kenneth E. Walters; vice-president, Dr. Venable; treasurer, Mr. Le Brun.
