

**Elkton Textile Company Enjoined**

**Violated Wage And Hour Laws—Employees Will Receive Back Wages**

U. S. District Judge W. Calvin Chesnut on August 12, signed a decree at Baltimore, enjoining the Elkton Textile Company, an Elkton firm employing some 200 hosiery workers, from violating the Wage Order issued for the full-fashioned hosiery industry, the overtime provisions, and the record keeping requirements of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938. The decree, which was consented to by Mr. Jack Kugelmann, president of the Elkton Textile Company, provides for the payment of back wages to employees and is the first entered in a U. S. District Court of Maryland restraining a company from requesting, soliciting, suggesting, or coercing, directly or indirectly, any present or past employee to return or to offer to return to the defendant or anyone acting for the defendant any money received as back wages or overtime compensation due under the Wage and Hour Law.

The inspection of the Elkton Textile Company was conducted by Wage and Hour inspectors, who acted under the supervision of Mr. H. Leo McCormick, Supervisor of the Wage and Hour office at Baltimore, Maryland. Mr. McCormick stated that approximately 200 employees were employed at the time of the inspection, which occurred in March, 1941. Present and former employees will receive approximately \$5,000.00 as back wages, under a stipulation in the decree.
