## Teepie Homestead Destroyed By Fire

Gifford H. Teepie's Colonial mansion on the York road, about one-half mile south of Hereford, Baltimore county, was destroyed by fire early Tuesday night, of last week. Loss of the residence was estimated at \$20,000 to \$30,000, and the loss of the furnishings was believed to amount to \$10,000.

The original section of the house, which had more than twenty rooms, was built in 1750 by the late Dr. Frederick Mitchell. The second section was built shortly after Colonial times, and the third section in 1865.

The entire house was burned to the ground, with the exception of four chimneys and the stone walls of the original house.

Mr. and Mrs. Teepie and their son Gifford, Jr., were driven from the home by the fire, which evidently started near the main chimney.

Neighbors succeeded in salvaging a great deal of furniture from the first and second floors of the three-story structure.

The burned dwelling was the birthplace of Mrs. J. B. Fassitt, of our town.

## LABOR UNION CAUSES TROUBLE AT ELKTON

Last week Labor Unions picketed the plant of the Triumph Explosive Company, near Elkton, in an effort to force agreement to an increase in wages.

The Trades Council of Wilmington and Baltimore took the action against the Contractors who are Union men. There is in construction at the plant some 287 frame buildings to fill navy contracts.

According to reports some 300 building trades workers are employed in the new plant construction. The dispute deals with painters and plumbers. Samuel H. Smith of Wilmington and secretary of the Building Trades Council took action together with the Baltimore Council. Many Delaware Union men and non Union men are working on the job.

The Unions are seeking wage increases and the exclusive employment of union men. A closed shop is desired.

Maryland State Police from Elkton and Conowingo sub-station together with county and town police were called to the Explosive plant on Wednesday morning where 39 agitators had arrived by car from the city in an effort to force the situation. Local police were armed for the emergency but the agitators left the ground shortly. A number of electricians, carpenters and plumbers quit work, it is said.

## House Repair Program

Announcement relative to a comprehensive "Repair for Defense" Program to be inaugurated by The Federal Housing Administration in Washington are issued by Mrs. Margaret E. Cronin, executive coordinator of the Cecil County Defense Council.

Every effort is being made to encourage owners of property suitable for remodeling to convert them into small family units for defense workers. Full details are being completed and will be made available to property owners through the Homes Registration Office.

## Injured In Auto Accident

William McCann, aged 73 years, a resident of Perryville, is in a serious condition in Union Hospital, Elkton, as a result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident on North Street, Elkton near the new high school building.

Mr. McCann was driving north and apparently did not know the road. When his machine reached the part of the street which turns into the Elkton-Newark road, he failed to turn in time and the machine crashed into a high embankment. The car was badly damaged and Mr. McCann sustained internal injuries. When found he was unconscious.

## Garage And Chicken House Burned

Just at the noon hour Monday an alarm of fire called Rising Sun firemen to the home of Jos. J. Devine, at Krauss Crossing, on the Harrisville-West Nottingham road, where a blaze had broken out in the garage. The firemen responded promptly, but the small frame building, together with a nearby chicken house were totally destroyed by the time they reached the scene with equipment. They prevented the flames from spreading to the dwelling. The origin of the fire is undetermined.

## New Union Hospital

The building committee of the new Union Hospital to be erected in Elkton, has engaged architects to draw up plans for the new institution. An effort is being made by the committee to obtain an appropriation from the federal government on the grounds that its facilities will be in a leading defense area with several government activities nearby.

## FOUND GUILTY OF SENDING THREATENING LETTER

### Court Imposes Sentence Of Five Years In The Maryland Penitentiary

Reginald Butler was found guilty by a jury after a two day trial in the Circuit Court, at Elkton, for sending a threatening letter through the mails to Mrs. Margaret Paxton of Elkton. The sentence of the Court was five years in the Maryland Penitentiary. Butler pleaded not guilty to the charge.

A letter was mailed to Mrs. Paxton and later on the advice of the police authorities, she went to the Railroad Station where Butler had told her by telephone to meet him. Butler in a car driven by a colored man, by the name of Williams, from Glasgow, drove by but did not stop and before he could return was apprehended by the police for a faulty headlight.

Returning home, Mrs. Paxton called again and testified that she recognized the voice. Handwriting of the maker of the note and Butler's was testified to as being one and the same.

Williams testified that Butler pointed Mrs. Paxton out at the station and on questioning by the colored man stated, that he, Butler was after money.

Curtis Collins of North East was found guilty by a jury for stealing a car at North East on August 4 belonging to Mrs. Kibler. Mr. and Mrs. Kibler had given Collins a ride to North East and as they did some shopping Collins drove off with the car. A number of young men of North East testified that they saw Collins drive off with the car. The Court sentenced Collins to two years in the Maryland Penitentiary. The testimony showed that the car was not recovered and that Collins had a record.

Woodrow Herman Dixon, formerly of Tazewell, Va., pleaded guilty to a bigamy charge and was sentenced to one year in Maryland Penitentiary.

The jury in the case of State vs. Walter Gibbs, colored, of lower Cecil county, failed to agree upon a verdict. He was released upon his own recognizance until the December term of Court.

FALSE REPORT OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS CASE

This community was thrown into a state of nervous tension on Tuesday morning of last week, when it became known that the physician called to attend Danny Garris, aged ten years, a pupil at the Elementary School here, pronounced the patient to be suffering from infantile paralysis.

The report spread like wild fire, parents of children hurrying to the school and taking their little ones home. An attendance at the school of about 200 pupils dropped to about 50 by afternoon, but word was received later from Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, where the patient was immediately taken, that the lad was not afflicted with the dread disease, and the tension was happily relieved.

Cut In State Tax Rate

An 8-cent cut in the State tax rate for 1942 and a similar reduction in the levy for 1943 was announced Thursday night by Governor O'Connor.

At the same time, the Governor indicated that, barring unforeseen events, he will call a special session of the Legislature to reduce the State income tax rate.

While the slash in the tax on real and personal property will not affect the levy for the current year, the contemplated cut in the income levy would be applicable to 1941 earnings.

The reductions in the 1942 real and personal property levy will cut that tax from 22 cents per \$100 to 14 cents, or roughly by forty per cent.

For 1943, the rate will be 13 cents per \$100, instead of 21 cents, a reduction of approximately forty-five per cent.

Library Moving

Work of moving the Cecil County Free Library from its quarters on East Main Street, Elkton, to quarters in the new Town Hall, provided by the Elkton Town Council, has been accomplished. It is expected that the new library quarters will be opened by Oct. 8.
