

School Properties Sold By Board Of Education

The Board of Education met in regular session on Tuesday, Oct. 14th. Those present were Dr. T. B. Moore, President; Mrs. Wallace Williams, Vice-Pres., and Mr. Reuben Reynolds.

The minutes of the regular meeting of September 9th were read and approved, and sundry bills ordered paid.

A letter was received from Mr. Albert G. Packard, Assistant Secretary of the Maryland State Teachers' Assn., asking that the Board of Education make its annual contribution of \$25.00 toward the expenses of the State Convention. This was approved by the Board.

The Superintendent reported that the school properties recently advertised for sale had been sold as follows: Blake School to Mr. Clemson Brown, North East, R. D., for the sum of \$370.00; Mt. Zoar Colored School to Mr. Daniel Stewart, Conowingo, for the sum of \$255.00 and Chapel School to Mr. Walter Robinson, of Port Deposit for the sum of \$202.00.

A letter was received from Mr. C. E. Douglas, Superintendent of Public Schools, Newark, Delaware, stating that one Jack Seeman was taking the Agricultural Course in the Newark School, but he had learned that the boy lived in Maryland, and he informed him that tuition would have to be paid. The Board decided not to pay the tuition of the above student in the Newark school.

The auditor's report for the year 1940-1941 was presented and received with interest by the Board.

Fire Destroys Market In Bel Air

One of the worst fires Bel Air has experienced in years destroyed a large super-market in the heart of the business section early Monday morning, damaged two other buildings and exhausted the town's 500,000 gallon tower supply of water.

The market building was a 75 by 200 ft. structure filled with general merchandise of a chain store organization.

One of the other buildings damaged was that of a tailoring company, where a stock of clothing and cloth valued at about \$20,000 was damaged by flames and water, firemen said. A 5-and-10-cent store, on the opposite side of the razed market, was also scorched.

An unidentified soldier discovered the blaze while walking past the market building.

Frank L. Hiser, president of the Bel Air Fire Company, said the damage might reach \$100,000. Collapsing walls allowed the blaze to spread to buildings on each side of the large store, and considerable damage by fire and water was done to stocks of a tailor shop and a retail store.

Harford County Boy Champion Milk Judge

Donald McKnight, of Dublin, Harford county, High school, won first place in the milk judging contest held at Springfield, Mass., in which vocational agriculture students from 13 States competed, according to Dr. H. Announcing a reduction in the State real estate tax rate for the fiscal years ending September 30th, 1942, and September 30th, 1943, and setting the said rate for each of said years:

"NOW I, HERBERT R. O'CONNOR, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, in pursuance of the direction contained in Chapter 528 of the Acts of the January 1941 session of the General Assembly of Maryland aforesaid do hereby set forth and proclaim that the State of Maryland tax on real estate has been reduced 8 cents on each \$100.00 of assessable property for each of the fiscal years ending September 30, 1942, and September 30, 1943, respectively, and that the rate for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1942, is therefore 14 cents and that for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1943, is 12 1/2 cents in each case on each \$100.00 of assessable property as provided by law".
