

Lions Club Activities

The guest speaker at the dinner meeting of the Lions Club, on Thursday evening last, at the Rising Sun Hotel, was Rev. John J. McGee, of Port Deposit. Rev. McGee in his talk ascribed the indifference and lack of unity on the part of the great mass of people to things spiritual, as a big factor in tending to promote the many ills and disturbing problems that confront our people. Conditions will not improve, he stated, until there is a better understanding and more cooperation among mankind in general.

A report of the activities of the Rising Sun Lions Club, during 1940, given at the 25th Annual Convention of the International Association of Lions Clubs, held at New Orleans, La., July 22-25, 1941, was read before the club. The report follows:

Rising Sun—Host to Zone meeting. Dedicated town's new incinerator, which the club was instrumental in having constructed. Installation of officers. Erected two Lions "Welcome" signs. Held outing. Netted \$42.00 on card party. Lady's Night. Held President's 100 per cent attendance meeting. Repaired and replaced glasses for several school children. Provided four uniforms for Boy Scout Troop. Netted \$46.00 on Venison Dinner. Observed Founder's Week. Constructed huge Coffee Pot; took it to foot ball games and sold hot dogs and coffee, and netted \$80.00. Also entered it in Hallock coffee pot every Saturday night regularly in Center Square, Rising Sun for charity fund.

Collected, repaired and distributed toys at Christmas. Presented Christmas baskets to 13 families. Induction of members. Helped other organizations fill and distribute 20 Christmas baskets, and gave candy and nuts to 70 children. Fitted five persons with glasses. Conducted Attendance Contest. Sent man to Eye Clinic, in Baltimore, for examination. Entertained delegation from Millersville, Pa., Lions Club. All membership reports received on time. Presented three keys and seven 100 per cent attendance pins.

The club has a membership enrollment of 40.

During 1940 there were 453 new clubs and 9,850 new members added to the rosters of Lions International giving the Association a total of 4,082 clubs and 147,407 members.

X-RAYING SELECTEES

The first report of the x-raying of Selectees as part of their Local Board examination was released today by the Maryland Tuberculosis Association. This x-raying has been done by the Association at its headquarters, 900 St. Paul Street, since September 22.

As of November 1, 1738 Selectees have been x-rayed, of which 23 were classified as 4F because of tuberculosis. This shows the rejections to be 1.32% which is comparable to the national average.

The Association pointed out that although 98.6% of the Selectees were classified as 1A only 31% or 539 men had lungs absolutely negative, while 67.6% or 1176 men had the tuberculosis germ in their lungs at one time during their lives but are perfectly fit for military service and are classified as 1A.

"As yet, we have not broken down these figures according to race, said William B. Matthews, Managing Director of the Maryland Tuberculosis Association. "When this is done, we will have an interesting study of the incidence of tuberculosis in young men in a large industrial city."

Mr. Matthews further explained that the x-rays are taken and developed at the Association's headquarters and then forwarded to Doctor Victor F. Cullen, Superintendent of State Sanatoria, for reading, the report of which is then sent to the Local Board.

It was further pointed out that similar work is being done in the counties by the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Health.

This x-raying of Selectees, as well as all other activities of the Maryland Tuberculosis Association, is financed through the annual sale of Christmas Seals which starts this year on November 24 and will continue through Christmas.
