

## Christmas Seal Sale Opens

### These Health Seals Finance Great Humanitarian Work

The 1941 tuberculosis Christmas Seal Sale is well on its way and returns are starting to come in, it was announced today by Doctor Samuel Wolman, President of the Maryland Tuberculosis Association.

Doctor Wolman called attention to the fact that these health seals finance the anti-tuberculosis work of the Maryland Tuberculosis Association and asked that everyone not only purchase them but also use them on your mail.

"These stamps not only give our mail a brighter appearance," said Doctor Wolman, "but they also tell the world that you are for health and enlightenment in these dark days of international chaos and disaster."

"To withstand the ravages of tuberculosis, a person must have a strong and healthy body. It is, therefore, necessary that we be doubly careful in these times."

Doctor Wolman also called attention to the fact that earlier in the week President Roosevelt had endorsed the Christmas Seal Campaign and in so doing the President said:

"With the approach of the Christmas Season, my mind turns to one of our most valuable and far-reaching traditions, the Christmas Seal which supports the fight against tuberculosis."

For 35 years the appearance of the small tuberculosis Seal on the flood of holiday mail has proved that we Americans are sincerely trying to protect our own against an insidious, communicable disease.

"The anti-tuberculosis campaign has long been a vital part of the foundation of the structure of our country because health is the first requisite of a nation as well as of an individual. This year, above all years, we must, and I am sure we will, faithfully observe one of our oldest, most worthy American customs... giving health to ourselves and to others through Christmas Seals."

The Christmas Seal Sale will close on Christmas Day.

### WOMAN LEADS WAY IN ANNUAL TEN-TON TOMATO CLUB CONTEST

History was made this year in the thirteenth annual Ten-Ton Tomato Club Contest when Mrs. Rowena Tull, of Whitman, broke all records for the contest by producing 21.16 tons per acre from 6.92 acres in the large acreage group, it is announced by Herman A. Hunter, specialist in canning crops for the University of Maryland Extension Service. Mrs. Tull manages a 160-acre farm, is one of the few women to take part in the contest and the only one to win a prize.

More than 300 tomato growers took part in the contest this year and 36 growers, the largest number on record, qualified by producing 10 or more tons to the acre. The contest followed the regulations of other years and was divided into two groups, dependent upon the acreage of tomatoes grown. The first group included growers with from two to five acres; the second group was made up of growers with more than five acres.

In addition to Mrs. Tull, in the large acreage group, a prize was awarded to Ross E. Smith, of White Hall, who produced 17.34 tons of tomatoes on 9.08 acres of land.

First prize in the small acreage group was won by Harry Reid, Trappe, with a production of 16.46 tons from 2.56 acres; and second prize in this class went to F. H. McConnell, Havre de Grace, who grew 16.34 tons of tomatoes on 3.26 acres.
