

Christmas Seals Provide For X-Ray Machine

CHRISTMAS SEALS



MERRY CHRISTMAS

Christmas Seals are presenting the Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene a high speed x-ray machine, it was announced at the Maryland Tuberculosis Association.

The machine, which will be used for mass surveys of the chest on a film that is only 4 x 5 inches in size. By using a small size film, the cost of x-raying is reduced tremendously while storage of plates which is always a consideration is also facilitated as the conventional size film is eleven times larger than the one taken by this machine.

"The death rate from tuberculosis in Baltimore City is the highest of the ten largest cities in the country," said William B. Matthews, Managing Director of the Maryland Tuberculosis Association.

"To control tuberculosis you have to find the case," Mr. Matthews continued, "and through mass x-raying many a new case will be found."

"What is most important the x-ray finds tuberculosis in its earliest stages before symptoms appear which, of course, makes the cure quicker and easier."

"I know no finer place to set up this high speed x-ray unit than under the jurisdiction of the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene," Mr. Matthews concluded.

The Maryland Tuberculosis Association, a non-profitable organization, has been in the front of the fight against the "white plague" since its conception in 1904. Its work, supported through the sale of the tuberculosis Christmas Seal, is state-wide and includes clinics, x-raying, tuberculin testing, medical research, health education, Negro program, and the like.

The present seal is the 35th one in Maryland. Commenting on this, Mr. Philip S. Morgan, Vice-President of the organization, said, "We are making strides against the disease as our program is a good one. However, it must be expanded if this 'Killer of Youth' is to be controlled during our lifetime."

"Maryland gives real challenge as our death rate from tuberculosis is the second highest among the States of the Union. Tuberculosis is a communicable disease and only through community effort can it be stamped out. Buy Christmas Seals and stamp out the 'white plague'," Mr. Morgan concluded.

The Association also announced that this coming Sunday, December 7, has been proclaimed as Christmas Seal Sunday and all clergymen are requested to mention the fight against tuberculosis in the pulpit.

CECIL COUNTY DAIRYMEN CO-OPERATING WITH UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND

Cecil County dairymen and livestockmen and the county agent are cooperating with the University of Maryland, Agronomy (crops and soils), Animal Husbandry, and Dairy Extension Departments in planning a three-year educational program for the improvement of feeding practices and to encourage the production of more and better quality home-grown feeds. The program is known as the "Maryland Livestock Feeding and Home-Grown Feed Production Program."

County Agent, J. Z. Miller and J. W. Magruder, Extension Agronomist, met with a committee of dairymen and livestock men last Friday evening to work out plans for this year's program. Those attending the meeting were: L. Wickes Davis, Norris Reynolds, Lloyd Balderston, Ray McGrady and E. G. MacDonald.

There are four main features of the program. (1) A county-wide two-day winter school is held each year at which time improved feeding and feed production methods are discussed.

(2) Nine well illustrated, timely service letters are prepared and mailed during the year to those enrolled. Up-to-date information on all phases of feeding and feed production is given.

(3) A farm tour is held annually to give local dairymen and livestock men an opportunity to visit a few Cecil county farmers who are doing an outstanding job in producing quality feeds or in following good feeding practices.

Two or more pasture improvement demonstrations are conducted in the county for the benefit of those interested in increasing the quality and productivity of their pastures.

Emphasis is placed on the production and feeding of high quality roughages, particularly pastures, hay and silage, to lower the feed cost.

Every dairyman and livestock man in Cecil County who is interested may attend any or all of the functions provided in this educational program.

In order to receive the notices of the various activities and to receive the service letters, enrollment is necessary. A letter explaining the purpose of the program is being mailed to each dairyman and livestock man in this county with an enrollment card. This card should be signed and returned by those who desire to participate in the program. Enrollment can also be made by telephone, letter, or otherwise at the County Agents' Office.

A meeting was held in the Court Room, second floor of the Court House, on Monday evening, December 1, at 7:45 to acquaint community leaders with the program.

State Road Improvement
