### Gives Hints For Handling Home Electric Units

Extension Service Specialist Urges Care With Cords, Plugs

If the directions accompanying electric appliances have been misliad, A. V. Krewatch, agricultural engineer for the University of Maryland Extension Service, says they may be summed up as follows: Operate the appliances as instructed, keep it clean and covered when not in use, oil as required, watch the cord that connects the appliance to the source of current and repair or replace it promptly if it becomes worn or fray-

In handling an appliance cord, Krewatch says, always grasp it by the plug and not by the cord itself. Rough handling is hard on the fine wires inside the cord and will cause them to break eventually. Then, they may cut through the protective covering in which they are wrapped. The cord should not be twisted or bent. Friction
