

to capitulate, and on the 1st of March the Prussian army under the command of the Prussian general Blücher, who seems to be retiring into Swedish Pomerania.

It appears from this as if we have hitherto been under a mistake in supposing that it was either the duke of Weimar's or Blücher's corps, that had retreated into Swedish Pomerania. Both these corps left Rhensberg on the 29th ult. The 23d bulletin describes Blücher to have left Rhensberg on the morning of the 29th, and the duke of Weimar to have remained there on that day. Bernadotte was on that day at Fursenberg, and it was supposed the duke would be unable to cut his way thro' them. Blücher, with 7,000 men, would, it was supposed, abandon, however, all idea of making good their retreat to the Oder, Blücher and the duke are said to have made a retrograde movement, with the view of retaining the Elbe, but the French had calculated upon this movement, and had taken measures accordingly. Whilst these events were taking place on the left bank of the Oder, Davoust had advanced to Custrin, which seems to have surrendered with little resistance as Stettin, tho' it is said to have been well provided for a defence—the garrison consisted of four thousand men. The easy capture of Custrin will surprise all military men—it is situated in the middle of a morass—no approach can be made without the greatest difficulty; and it would have been in less danger from any attack of a besieging army than from famine. The French are thus in possession of all the course of the Oder from Custrin to its mouth. They have also, it is said, advanced into Poland—whilst the Bavarian and Wirtemberg troops, under Jerome Bonaparte, are proceeding to Silesia. Louis Bonaparte is advancing into Hanover, and Morcier into the electorate of Hesse.

Such is the substance of the 22d, 23d, 24th and 25th bulletins, contained in the French papers to the 12th; the Dutch to the 16th, communicate some further and later accounts, but they do not appear to be official.

### BY THIS DAY'S MAILS.

#### WASHINGTON-CITY, February 2.

We have received N. Orleans papers to the 1st of January. They contain no articles of interest, except a long address to the public by Edward Livingston, vindicating himself against the charge of implication in Burr's conspiracy, made by Gen. Wilkinson. The address closes with the following affidavit:

Edward Livingston, of the city of N. Orleans, counsellor at law, being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God, doth depose, that he hath never had any communication, written or verbal, direct or indirect, with Aaron Burr or any other person, whom he knows or has reason to suspect, to be concerned with him in the plans now said to be carrying on, in the U. States, relative to the constitution of the U. States, or to any such plans, and that he is utterly ignorant of the existence of any such schemes, on the part of the said Aaron Burr, or his adherents, except from the public papers, the communication of Gen. Wilkinson and the voice of public report.

(Signed) EDWARD LIVINGSTON. Sworn this 26th day of December, 1806, before me DOM. A. HALL, District Judge of the U. States for the Orleans district.

#### FRANKFORT, Jan. 8.

General Winlock, who commands the detachment of militia, now on duty at the falls of Ohio, has arrested Messrs. Thomas M. Winn and Samuel N. Lockett, both of Jefferson county, on suspicion of being concerned in Col. Burr's expedition. Four boats which they were preparing to send off, have been detained, and themselves bound in a recognizance by Judge Ormsby, to appear at the next circuit court, the former in the sum of 5000 dollars, the latter in 10,000 dollars. Another boat, found on the Indian side of the Ohio, and supposed to belong to Davis Floyd, has also been detained.

General Winlock repaired to Louisville on the 26th ultimo, and positively asserts that no boats or other craft have passed the falls since that time without examination.

Captain Samuel Phillips, of Jefferson county, informs the general that he passed Colonel Burr on the 31st ult. at an encampment near the mouth of Cumberland river, where it is conjectured he is endeavoring to collect his troops and provisions.

The above information was communicated to the governor by express, the evening before last.

It is reported that Colonel Burr has three or four hundred men assembled at his encampment. If the latter should be his whole force at that place, Colonel Ramsey, of Livingston county, who is authorized by the executive to call out eight companies of militia, will give a good account of him. Col. R. is expected to be ready to act by the 2d inst.

And at a meeting of the directors, James Calhoun esq. was unanimously re-elected president.

A letter from the state of Kentucky, dated 7th January 1807, says, that Colonel Burr had obtained there a negotiation of his notes, to the amount of 100,000 dollars, which it is expected will never be recovered—that the Kentuckians yet appear ignorant of Burr's project, and that they have declined sending their produce to Natchez and New-Orleans, until a more favorable prospect of security from conspirators.

The legislature of the Mississippi territory convened at the town of Washington on the 2d ultimo. Cowles MEALE, the acting governor of the territory, delivered before them a lengthy speech—in which he recommends various important subjects to their consideration—such as the establishment of seminaries of learning, the improvement of roads, &c. Speaking of the requisition of a portion of the militia, made by General Wilkinson he says—

“Having been called in by the commanding general of the army of the United States for a certain portion of the militia of this territory, I exerted every talent to a-

rouse that generous spirit of patriotism which was necessary to the completion of that requisition, and I felt me here to express the pride which I permit in the prompt and zealous co-operation which I received from the officers and men of the territory—it will stand on record a monument of their devotion to their country, and has given this executive the pleasing assurance that the people of this territory will never be backward in defending those rights and protecting those privileges which constitute them the freest and happiest people on earth. But gentlemen, I have to regret that the military pride of the territory could not have been displayed in a way more substantially beneficial to the real interest of our country; I had fondly hoped that the crisis had arisen when we might avenge the long catalogue of injuries received from a troublesome and unjust neighbor—and thereby, removed the cause of many fears which will ever hang over us, so long as they occupy our vicinity. How far the commanding general may have served the views of the general government, is for that government to decide; but as their fortuitous representative, I have no hesitation in saying, that we never can be safe until the Floridas are owned by the United States, and therefore was of opinion that we should embrace the earliest opportunity of taking them by force. The Spanish government has been forward in giving its causes of offence, and have repeatedly done those things which would justify hostilities on our part.”

We understand that a sailor, who had been amusing himself by skating on the ice below the fort, on Sunday afternoon, broke in and was unfortunately drowned. Three of his companions broke in at the same time, but by great exertions were saved from a watery grave. [Post.]

### CURIOUS PHENOMENON.

There are few subjects within the sphere of natural philosophy, which are involved in more obscurity, than those which relate to the various changes of the atmosphere. This element underwent a change on Monday morning last, which was different from any we recollect to have witnessed. The sun rose after the snow with great lustre, the atmosphere was uncommonly clear. About half after 8 o'clock, the Thermometer of Fahrenheit, from being a little below the freezing point, suddenly fell to 26, and continued at that point for almost half an hour. This change in the temperature of the atmosphere was accompanied by one in its aspect. The earth became suddenly enveloped in a fog of uncommon density, resembling smoke. How shall we account for the circumstances of the fog? It is generally observed that when the atmosphere is in a foggy state, the temperature is rather warm to the senses, and of that kind, which is generally termed relaxing. But in this instance it was attended by a degree of cold which we believe, in this place, to be quite unparalleled. The cold was of too short duration, to be observed by those who were within doors, but to those who were without it was almost intolerable. [Virg. Argus.]

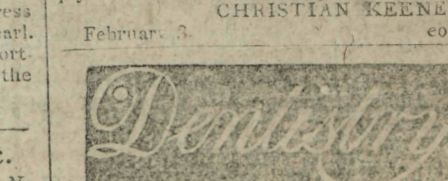
