AN ACT

For the punishment of Forgery and for other purposes.

WHEREAS it has been represented to this general assembly, that the crime of forging bank notes and negotiable notes hath greatly increased, and the punishment already provided by law, not being thought sufficient to prevent the commission of the crime, for remedy thereof

BE it enacted by the general assembly of Maryland, That any person who shall with a fraudulent intent, employ an artist to engrave or cut any plate, in imitation of the note or notes of any established bank within this state, or of any bank which may hereafter be established within this state, or which are or may be established by law in any of the United States, or any person engaged in engraving or etching such plate or plates, or any person in any manner engaged in striking impressions from such plate or plates, or any person who shall affix to such notes, fraudulent or forged signatures, or any person who shall be in any manner concerned in the altering, forging or counterfeiting, any note of any bank now existing within this state, or of any bank which may hereafter be established in this state, or any person who may pass within this state, forged or counterfeit notes (knowing them to be such) purporting to be the genuine notes of a bank regularly constituted within any of the United States, or any person who may pass as genuine any note purporting to be a note of a bank which does not exist, or shall pass as genuine negotiable notes, any forged or counterfeit negotiable notes or paper whatsoever, or who shall erase or alter any genuine negotiable note or negotiable paper, or any endorsement thereupon; or shall tender in payment, or in any way utter, any such erased, altered, or counterfeit note or notes, or negotiable paper (knowing such bill or note, or negotiable paper, or the endorsement thereon, to be altered, forged, counterfeited, erased or falsified) with intention to defraud the said bank or banks, or any other person, shall be adjudged a felon, and shall be condemned to death without benefit of clergy. Spanish Consul's Office.

BALTIMORE, 7th February, 1867.

THE undersigned, his Catholic Majesty's Consul for the state of Maryland, makes known to all whom it does or may concern, that by an official communication he has received from the Intendant General of the Island of Cuba, dated Havana, 24 January, 1867, enclosing his late decree of 24th December, 1866, he is instructed to notify in the most public manner, all merchants and others interested, that the Intendant's former decree of 3d July, 1865, (which requires the invoices and manifests of all goods imported from neutral ports into those of the Island of Cuba, should be duly certified by the consuls or vice consuls of His Catholic Majesty) has not been generally observed; in order to do away every pretext, and have no room for supposing a relaxation therein because a strict compliance therewith has unaccountably been in some instances dispensed with; And the said regulations should not be considered as arbitrary, oppressive or novel, but as an essential and positive determination emanating from the general government; and the Intendant aforesaid to insure its strict observance in future has now decreed that "from and after the first day of March next, all shipments made in neutral ports, for any of the ports of the Island of Cuba arriving after said first day of March, must be provided with statements or invoices, containing an individual and detailed relation of the number, weight, measure, quality and value of the goods or effects constituting the cargo of such ships; and making particular mention of the port of said Island to which they are bound; which invoices must absolutely be duly notified by the Consul or Vice Consul of His Catholic Majesty residing therein; and are to be deposited at the respective custom-houses of the ports of said Island; with this circumstance, that whatever goods, wares, or merchandise, found on board any vessel, not accompanied with its correspondent invoice certified by the consul aforesaid or otherwise included and particularly expressed therein, shall be seized and confiscated without appeal."

A duplicate of the invoice and manifest will be required in order to remain in this office, and as the originals are intended to remain in the customs—another copy will necessarily be forwarded by the shippers to their correspondents in the ports of said Island.
