

Scheer's division in the first line, that of Gazi in the second, and that of Gudin in the third division of the army commanded by Gen. Darnaud upon his left.

The combat was spirited. After a few struggles the enemy was overpowered. The 17th regiment of light infantry, and the 34th, covered themselves with glory. Generals Vedel & Caparde were wounded. General Treillard, commanding the light cavalry of the army, Gen. Bousard, commanding a brigade of the division of the dragons of Bekker, Col. Barthelémy of the 15th regiment of dragons, were wounded by grape shot. Voisin, aid to marshal Lannes, and Curial, aid to Gen. Souchet, both fell with glory.

Marshal Lannes was slightly touched with a ball. The 5th corps of the army here exhibited what brave men are able to perform, and the immense superiority of the French infantry over that of other nations. Marshal Lannes, although he had been for ten days sick would follow his corps. The 8th regiment sustained many charges of the enemy's cavalry, with coolness and success. The enemy the same night sounded a retreat and retired to Ostrodenka.

BATTLE OF GOLYMIN.
While the corps of Benigen was at Pultusk and beaten there, that of Buxhoden joined Golymin at night. The division Painin of this corps which had been attacked the evening before by the grand duke of Berg, another division which had been beaten at Nasielsk, arrived by different routes at the camp of Golymin.

Marshal Davoust, who pursued the enemy from Nasielsk, came up with, charged them and chased them from a wood near the camp of Golymin.

At the same time marshal Angereau, arriving at Golacima, took the enemy in flank. The gen. of brigade, Lapine, with the 16th light infantry, carried at the point of the bayonet a village which served as a point of support to the enemy. The division of Heudelat displayed and marched for it. Three hours afterwards the fire was the hottest. The grand duke of Berg executed with the greatest success many charges, in which Kleir's division of dragons distinguished themselves. Notwithstanding evening came on too soon, the combat continued till eleven at night. The enemy retreated in disorder, leaving their artillery, bag and baggage, and many dead. All the enemy's columns retreated to Ostrokerka.

Gen. Fenerolle, commanding a brigade of dragons was killed. The intrepid gen. Rapp, the emperor's aid du camp, was wounded at the head of a division of dragons. Col. Simile, of the brave 24th of the line, was wounded. Marshal Angereau had a horse killed under him.

Nevertheless, marshal Scott, with his corps had already arrived at Molat, two leagues from Makow; but the badness of the roads from the rains and shaws retarded his march and saved the Russian army, of which, without this accident, not a man would have escaped. The good fortune of the army of Benigen and that of Buxhoden should have terminated on the other side of the Ocyre; but all the intended movements were defeated by the shaws, which caused the artillery to be two days in making three leagues.

Altogether the Russians have lost 80 pieces of cannon, all their waggons, and 12,000 men killed, wounded or made prisoners. The movements of the French and Russian columns, will be an object of curiosity for military men, when they are traced upon the map. They will then see upon how slender a thread hung the capture or annihilation of this army, and all the effect of a single fault committed by the Russian general.

We have lost 800 men killed, and had 8,000 wounded. At length, finding himself master of the enemy's artillery, and all their positions, and having driven them more than 40 leagues, the emperor has ordered his army into winter quarters.

Before this expedition, the Russian officers declared, that they had 150,000 men. Now they do not pretend to reckon half that number. Shall we believe their report before the battle or after it?

FEDERAL GAZETTE.

MONDAY, MARCH 16.

The schr. Palladium, arrived at Boston, in 60 days from Malaga, spoke on the 14th ult. in lat. 38 56, ship Stratford, from Baltimore for Bordeaux, out 7 days.

The report of the death of Mango-Park, who is said to have fallen a victim in the interior of Africa, is now found to be untrue. Accounts were received of him at Cam-bridge in England, in October last, which stated his arrival at Tombuctoo, and that he is on his return home. [Nassau paper.]

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in New-Orleans, to his friend in this city, dated February 15, 1807.

"We have been for sometime past in a state of considerable alarm and anxiety, occasioned by the intended expedition of Burr for this place, and the defenceless state in which our government has left this country, the brightest ornament of their power if they knew or prized it—not one thousand troops in Louisiana and on our extensive frontier! I never thought we had much to fear from Burr. Our last account says he has made off from Natchez, and that gov. Williams of that territory has offered a reward of 2000 dollars for apprehending him. I think our danger is from the Spaniards. Indeed for two years past I have suspected that they meditated an attack, and could have taken the country, as they would have found no opposition, there being no effective force in the country. I hope, however, the eyes of our government are opened, and that we shall have some protection afforded us. Confidence between man and man is nearly extinct, and property is very much depreciated, in consequence of the prospect of a Spanish war. We are fortifying the city."

El Corriere Spanish Letter of Marque Packet N. 4, from Havana for La Vera Cruz, taken by the Port Mahon, has arrived at Nassau.

By ROBERT WILLIAMS, Governor of the Mississippi Territory, A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas Aaron Burr, Esq. late vice-president of the United States, was found in a recognition to appear at the supreme court of this territory, himself in the sum of five thousand dollars, and two securities in the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars each, to answer any bills of indictment that might be found against him, and to continue to appear from day to day, until dismissed by the said court, which he has failed to comply with, and, as it appears, has made his escape—

I do, therefore, issue this my proclamation for apprehending the said Aaron Burr, Esq. and by the powers and authorities which I possess, will pay or cause to be paid to any person or persons who will take the person of the said Aaron Burr, and cause him to be delivered to me at this place, or to the president of the United States, the sum of two thousand dollars.

Given under my hand at the town of Washington, this 6th day of February, 1807.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Rotterdam, dated Jan. 12, 1807, to his correspondent in New-York.

"The late ryal non-intercourse law with England had given rise to serious doubts, whether or not vessels coming from America, but having touched at England, would be admitted in our ports. Now we have received the assurance, and I have the pleasure to inform you, that ships coming from your country, and which either for orders, or on account of stress of weather, or for want of water, have been obliged to run into an English port, will be admitted as heretofore, provided that by their papers it appears that they have neither landed nor taken in England, any part of their cargo, and the required certificates of the Dutch or French consuls must not be forgot."
