

country cheerfully assisted in their conveyance.

French troops are joining the Russian army, which by the middle of February will comprise three hundred thousand men between the Neimen and the Vistula.

Gen. Tolstoy commands a corps of 16,000 men at Slesce; gen. Bagonaut is posted at the little village of Martinky, on the Omuleio, across which river he has established a bridge; general Tolly commands the advance of the left wing of the army at Slesce; the rear, with general Osterman, has fallen back upon the strong position of Kolno; and the other corps of the army, under the orders of prince Dolgorousky, gen. Somdoff, &c. occupy Wozna, Baitstock, Mazow, &c. General Bakhovden's division occupies Nowygrad, Clinki, Lomza, &c.

The whole of the army is thus concentrated within the circuit of a few miles, notwithstanding the difficulty to provide provisions and forage; and it is hence obvious, that general Kamensky is determined to resume offensive operations the moment he is in a condition to do so. The Russian army is impatient to meet the enemy—nothing can surpass their enthusiasm and confidence.

General Sitoff, previous to the affair at Fraingurkaw, read at the head of his detachment, one of the French bulletins, containing scurrilous reflections on the Russian army, on which the soldiers in tumultuous indignation, exclaimed, "Lead us on, and we will punish our calumniators." A strong Prussian corps has taken possession of the defiles of Nikolark. The French division under Ney, has fallen back behind the Dribentz; and a corps of about 300 men, which had pushed beyond Osterode, was surrounded by a Prussian regiment at Dentsch Eylau, and cut to pieces.

"That you may judge of the risk and danger which attended Bonaparte's person, his aide-de-camp, Segur, is taken prisoner. Every one is anxiously waiting further particulars."

Such is the official account published at Petersburg. In every point of view it deserves to be considered as a great victory. We shall be told, perhaps, that no ground was gained, and that it did not produce the effect of forcing the French to abandon the Naraw, and fall back upon the Vistula. But it is the first decisive check that the arms of Bonaparte have experienced upon the continent. He has gone on from victory to victory, in an unbroken series, till at last it had almost been to be believed that wherever he carried his arms they must be successful. The Russians, however, have weakened that belief, and beat him in a battle in which he commanded in person, superintending the operations, and directing all the movements. Had he not been there, it would have been said the battle was lost because he was absent. It is to be remarked too, that the French were beat, not by superior numbers, but by the promptitude and decision of the Russian movements, by the dexterity and skill of the Russians manoeuvres.

Considering the victory in this point of view, deeming it an achievement highly honorable to the Russian arms, and affording us an earnest of future success, we must say we were disgusted at the cold, cheerless manner in which the government gazette speaks of the battle. Instead of the tone of congratulation and triumph, we find a chilling comfortless acknowledgment that the Russians, "though unprepared for this contest, have made their retreat without any considerable loss, certainly with an army unbroken—with a victory, by their own accounts."

By the middle of this month, the Russian army between the Niemen and the Vistula will be 300,000 strong.

The Petersburg official accounts makes no mention of any battles after the 26th; and it is to be remarked that in that account, as well as in general Benningen's letter to the king of Prussia, not a word is said of Buxhovden's division.—Was it really not engaged? and is the French report of the battle with Buxhovden a mere invention? We must suppose it to be so, because we find Benningen's left wing engaged with the division under Davoust, who was said, in the French Bulletin, to have attacked Buxhovden.

MONDAY, MARCH 23.

We are informed that Mr. Bowen, proprietor of the *Columbian Museum*, at Boston, which was lately destroyed by fire, is now in this city, soliciting aid from the liberal promoters of the arts and sciences. We hope that his appeal will be as favorably received by the citizens of Baltimore, as it has been in Philadelphia and New-York, that he may be enabled to commence the re-establishment of his institution.

THE TREATY.

We believe we have it now in our power to relieve the public mind from that uncertainty in which it has heretofore been suspended. The treaty will be immediately returned to London for further negotiation. For this purpose the Wasp ship of war is ordered to be got ready for sea immediately—the officers are selected; the crew completed, and Thursday next is named as the day on which she is to sail. Capt. Smith, who is to command the Wasp, will be the bearer of the treaty to London; from thence the Wasp will repair to the Mediterranean, where she is to be stationed.

In conversation on the subject of the treaty, the president has been heard to declare, that had he been laid in before the senate, and that body had been unanimous in advising its ratification, still he would have withheld the sanction of his signature. So hostile does he feel himself to some of its principles, and so determined on its total rejection in its present form.

From Lloyd's List, to Feb. 12, 1807. The ship Paulina, Clarke, from Baltimore for New-Castle, on entering the Tyne, in the night of the 16th of January, went on shore on the Herd Sand, but little prospect of being bilged, part of the cargo and all the crew saved.

Six Sisters, Wirgman, from Baltimore arrived at Bristol, England, in 26 days. The Carlisle, for Baltimore, passed by Gravesend February 6.

Extract of a letter from Bermuda, received at Philadelphia, dated 10th March.

During the last week the court sat for about seven hours in the case of the Columbian Packet. Nothing decisive has been done, except as to the shipments of Messrs. Hargous, Hollingsworth & Son and Bousquet, which were restored.

A decree will probably take place as to the rest at the next court, though from some remarks that fell from the judge, upon the deficiency of the evidence, I very much apprehend it will not be favorable.

In the course of the trial, the judge, observed that where the right to the property rested principally upon letters from the claimant's correspondent, the originals, and not copies of such letters ought to be produced.

In the case of the schr. Intrepid, Suter, the trial of which took place the week preceding that of the Columbian packet, further proof has been ordered, as the judge thought there was reason to suspect that the outward cargo had been imported into the United States, from the colonies by the schr. and that there was a continuity of voyage from the colonies to the mother country.

The Baltic, Donaldson, got in here a few days ago, after beating about the island upwards of a week.

The brig Mary, Marshal, from New-York for Jamaica, ship Callopie, from New-York for Havana, were brought in here for trial, the latter however was liberated.

As the same danger with which vessels proceeding from the U. States to Danish ports are liable to threaten the public state of health, in no less degree exists with those bound to other ports on the Baltic, his majesty's government has invited the neighboring powers to adopt similar precautions with vessels bound from the U. States to any of their respective ports, as by the royal ordinance of 15th May 1805, has been prescribed for Danish vessels as well as others proceeding from United States for any Danish port. It has in consequence thereof been agreed between his majesty's government and the governments of Sweden, Russia and Prussia, that consular certificates shall henceforth be furnished either by Danish consuls or vice-consuls, where those powers themselves have no commercial agents or by theirs, vice versa, where no Danish consuls or vice-consuls reside. Any vessel therefore to whatever nation it may belong which after public notice has been given of this arrangement, shall proceed from the United States to any Danish port or to any port on the Baltic, without being provided with a consular certificate of health, will be absolutely, on its arrival at the Sound, or at its port of destination, if not bound to the Baltic, be subjected to quarantine for a longer or shorter time, according to circumstances, even if it should be provided with clean Bills of Health from the respective authorities."
