SAVANNAH, March 6.  
Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Jamaica, to his correspondent in this city, dated 26th January, 1807.  
"In consequence of Dessaline's murder, Christophe was elected president, but the thirst of ambition was no less prevalent with him, who soaring to the title of emperor, had recourse to arms, and was repulsed in three pitched battles, is now deserted by his army, and with a few companions was obliged to take refuge in the woods.  
"A cargo of lumber would command 200 dollars per thousand.—Coffee is from 16 to 20 sous (equal to 10 cents).  
The following note was sent on board the brig Fame, capt. Tallman, arrived here a day or two ago, from Dominica, when about two leagues at sea:—  
"Have the goodness to report, that the Caroline, of Philadelphia, from Bordeaux for New-Orleans, has been detained by his Britannic majesty's brig Dominica, and sent to Rousseau, (Dom.)  
"9th February, 1807."  
Capt. Tallman saw the brig going in, and supposes the captain forgot, thro' haste, to put his name to the note.

CHARLESTON, March 10.  
We understand that captain Macomb, of the corps of engineers, has been here these two months waiting for the commissioners of state to locate and deliver over to him, for the United States, the sites for fortifications which the state lately ceded to the United States—but, owing to some difficulty in obtaining the map on which these sites are particularly delineated, we are informed the commissioners are prevented from proceeding.  
Colonel Williams, commandant of the corps of engineers, an officer of distinguished merit, is expected here daily, for the purpose of making arrangements for the defence of the harbor. We hope that he may not be detained, on his arrival, for the delivery of the sites.  
The packet brig Hope, Ash, from New-York, for Savannah, went ashore 35 miles north of Cape Hatteras, on the 22d ult. the vessel is entirely lost, cargo saved.

March 11.  
The stage arrived last night without the Northern mail; three are now due. From the immense quantity of rain which has fallen, the country is literally overflowed; all the bridges are carried away, and the back water in the swamps has no outlet; it is therefore probable that it will be many days before we shall receive a mail.  
Arrived, ship Pocahontas, Howland, Lisbon, 45 days; schr. Three Friends, Sears, Trinidad, 16; Sea-Flower, Cathcart, Satilla (Geo.) 2; sloop Kolla, Fuller, Providence, (R. I.) 13.  
Captain Howland, on the 3d Feb. in lat. 22, 56, long. 35, 40, passed a fleet of 250 sail of British merchantmen, steering to the west. Feb. 6, fell in with 117 sail more, from Cork, bound to Barbados—was boarded by one sloop of war. Feb. 26, in lat. 25, 47, long. 68, 33, spoke brig Industry, homeward bound to Newport, from Alicante, 29 days out. Same day, spoke ship Polly, 12 days from Norfolk, bound to Jamaica. March 8, in lat. 32, 11, long. 74, spoke brig Rose-Ann, 4 days out from Turk's-Island, bound to Baltimore.

Off St. Croix, captain Sears was boarded by a British frigate, who informed, that the French and Spanish privateers in the West-Indies, were capturing American vessels from British ports.  
March 12.  
Capt. Boyd, of the schr. Peallupper, arrived on Tuesday evening, in 10 days from St. Jago de Cuba, informs us, that the market at that place was very dull for American produce. The full duties, amounting to 30 per cent. are now enforced on all articles imported. Several privateers were fitting out at that place.

PROCLAMATION.  
WHEREAS by an act entitled "An act to suspend the operation of an act entitled an act to prohibit the importation of certain goods, wares and merchandize, and to remit the penalties incurred under the same," the president of the United States is authorized further to suspend the operation of the said prohibitory act, if in his judgment the public interest should require it; provided that such suspension shall not extend beyond the second Monday in December next:—  
And whereas it is judged for the public interest that such suspension should take place:—  
Now, therefore, be it known, that I, THOMAS JEFFERSON, President of the United States, by virtue of the authority aforesaid, do hereby suspend the operation of the act entitled "An act to prohibit the importation of certain goods, wares and merchandize," passed on the eighteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and six, until the second Monday in December next.

In testimony whereof I have caused the seal of the United States to be affixed to these presents, and signed the same with my hand.  
Done at the city of Washington, the twenty-fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seven, and of the sovereignty and independence of the United States of America the thirty-first.

WONDERFUL!  
Extract of a letter from Bordeaux, (received at Charleston, S. C.) dated the 12th January, to a gentleman in that city.  
"It is reported this morning, that a terrible battle has been fought near Warsaw, on the borders of the Vistula, between our army and the Russians, in which the Russians were defeated. It took place on the 22d, at 3 o'clock. The Russians had 52,000 men killed; we lost 15,000 Poles, and 7,000 French. The number of prisoners is not yet known; they are reported to be more than 80,000.

COLONEL BURR AGAIN.  
We have just received certain intelligence that the executive have ordered a party of marines to meet col. Burr in order to escort him to Richmond, in Virginia, there to be kept until the meeting of the federal court in that state, on the supposition that his expedition was fitted out from Blennerhassett's island, which is said to be in Virginia.

No further information has been received since our last, relative to the apprehension of Mr. Burr.  
Subsequently to the escape of Burr, Blennerhassett, and Ralston were brought before judge Toulman at Washington, and examined. The judge had determined, before he gave a decision, to wait for information expected from Dr. Carmichael.

PANTHEON.  
The following questions will be discussed at the Polemic society on Saturday next:  
Can the conduct of general Wilkinson, as stated, be justifiable?  
Is it politic to prohibit the commercial intercourse between this country and St Domingo?
