AN ORDINANCE.

For the Inspection of Beef and Pork in the city of Baltimore.

I. BE it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That all salted beef and pork in barrels, put up in or brought to the city of Baltimore for sale, shall be inspected agreeably to the provisions of this ordinance: And a person skillful in the goodness, quality and well-curing of salted beef and pork, shall be appointed inspector thereof: And it shall and may be lawful for said inspector, with the approbation and consent of the mayor, to appoint a deputy, who shall have the same power, and be allowed the same fees, as the said inspector: Provided nevertheless, That the said inspector shall be answerable for the conduct of his deputy. And the said inspector shall obtain annually, on the first day of May, a license, under the seal of the corporation; and for every such licence he shall pay to the register, for the use of the city, one hundred dollars. And he shall give bond with security, to the satisfaction of the mayor, for the faithful performance of the duties of his office. And he shall keep an exact account of the number of barrels and half-barrels of beef and pork by him inspected, (separately enumerating that which may be put up in the city or precincts of Baltimore) and once in every three months make a return thereof, on oath or affirmation, to the mayor, who is to cause the same to be published in one or more newspapers of this city.

II. And be it enacted and ordained, That each and every barrel of salted beef or pork, of the dimensions hereinafter mentioned, shall contain at least two hundred pounds net weight: And the inspector is hereby directed to examine and pass all such beef and pork, packed in such barrels, as shall appear to him to be merchantable, sound, and fit for exportation, branding on each barrel the figures 200. And if any person or persons shall offer for inspection any barrel or barrels of beef or pork, to be of the dimensions hereinafter mentioned, and containing in any barrel a less quantity than is hereby directed, he, she or they shall forfeit and pay, if the deficiency be six pounds or under, the sum of ten cents for each and every pound so deficient; and for every pound over six pounds, twenty cents for each and every pound so deficient: but the said inspector may, and he is hereby authorized and required to pass and brand all half-barrels of beef and pork, containing the quantity of one hundred pounds weight, branding each half-barrel, in figures, 100. And if any person or persons shall pack a less quantity of beef or pork, in any of the half-barrels as aforesaid, than one hundred weight, he, she or they shall forfeit and pay the sum of twenty cents for every pound so deficient.

III. And be it enacted and ordained, That the inspector aforesaid is hereby required, on inspection, to brand all barrels and half-barrels of beef and pork by him inspected, that shall be merchantable and sound, either with the word first, second, or third, according to the quality thereof; and all barrels and half-barrels of other inferior quality, with the word refuse; and he shall brand each barrel and half-barrel of salted beef and pork, cured within the United States, that is found merchantable at the time of inspection, with the words "for bounty," with a public brand mark to be provided by him for that purpose.

IV. And be it enacted and ordained, That all beef or pork barrels brought to or put up in the city of Baltimore, shall be of good seasoned materials, tightened with at least twelve hoops, sufficiently nailed with four nails in each chime hoop, and three nails in each upper bilge hoop, sufficient to hold pickle, and of the following dimensions, to wit; beef barrels to be twenty-eight inches the length of the stave, seventeen inches diameter the head, and twenty-one inches the bilge diameter from out to out; all pork barrels to be twenty-eight inches long, seventeen inches and one half of an inch diameter the head, and twenty-one inches and one half of an inch bilge diameter from out to out; the croze to be cut not more than one inch and a quarter from the top of the stave, or less than one inch and one-eighth of an inch, the staves to be one half of an inch thick, and may be made out of any well-seasoned timber (pine and cypress excepted) sufficient to hold pickle and the hoop not less than one inch diameter at the small end, under the penalty of eight dollars.

V. And be it enacted and ordained, That all and every barrel or half barrel of beef or pork brought to or put up in the said city for sale or exportation, shall be submitted to the view and examination of the inspector aforesaid, who shall search and try the same, by opening one of the heads and examining whether it be honestly and well packed, and also whether it be sound, good and of sufficient weight; and if the said inspector shall judge the same to be merchantable, he shall brand every such barrel and half barrel on the quarter or bilge with the word Baltimore, with a public brand mark, to be provided for that purpose, and also the word beef, or pork, as the case may be; for which the said inspector, shall have and receive from the owner or owners of such beef or pork, ten cents for each and every cask so inspected, examined and branded by him, and no more; and the importer into the city of Baltimore of every barrel or half barrel of beef or pork shall, within forty-eight hours after the landing or delivery of the same, deliver to the inspector or to his deputy a written report, ascertaining the number of casks, and the place wherein the same shall be deposited, so that the

same may be inspected, under the penalty of one dollar for each and every cask so imported; and no inspector shall brand any barrel or half barrel of beef or pork which he may judge unsound or unmerchantable according to the true intent and meaning of this ordinance, but shall cause the same to be marked on the bilge with the broad arrow or secure it for a further examination if required; which examination the owner shall procure to be made within the space of four days; and the inspector shall and may demand and receive from the owner or owners thereof, the same compensation as if the same had been branded.

VI. And be it enacted and ordained, That when any person shall think himself aggrieved by the judgment of the inspector, such person may apply to the mayor, who shall issue his warrant, directed to three disinterested persons, well skilled in the goodness or quality and well curing of salted beef or pork, to review and examine the same, which said three persons after having taken an oath of office as reviewers, shall carefully view and examine the same, and if they or any two of them shall declare the same to be sound and merchantable, then, and in such case, the said inspector shall erase out the broad arrow, and put such brand on the cask containing said salted provisions as they or any two of them shall adjudge and determine: And the corporation shall be allowed six cents per barrel for storage, if stored, and if upon an appeal and review as aforesaid, the judgment of the inspector shall be confirmed, the person appealing shall pay the expense of such storage, and shall also pay the same if an appeal shall not be prosecuted; and if the judgment of the inspector shall be reversed then the corporation shall defray the charge of the storage.

VII. And be it enacted and ordained, That it shall not be lawful for any person to ship or lade on board of any vessel, for exportation any casks of the said salted provisions, so marked with the broad arrow, or to sell, ship, or lade on board of any ship or vessel for exportation any of the casks of salted provisions not examined, and branded as aforesaid, under the penalty of ten dollars for each and every barrel so exported, or laden on board of any ship, or other vessel for exportation, nor shall it be lawful for any person or persons to purchase or sell in the city of Baltimore, any cask or casks of salted beef, or pork, not previously inspected, examined or branded, under the penalty of ten dollars for each cask so sold within the said city.

VIII. And be it enacted and ordained, That the said inspector shall not purchase, directly or indirectly, any salted beef or pork by him condemned, or any beef or pork whatsoever; other than for his own family's use; nor shall he directly or indirectly be concerned in making, vending, or furnishing any cask or casks or purchasing or vending any salt, for the purpose of packing or repacking or curing any beef or pork, brought to, packed in, or exported from the city or port of Baltimore, nor shall he be concerned in the cooverture of any casks containing beef or pork that shall be inspected in said city, under the penalty of forfeiting for each and every offence aforesaid the sum of ten dollars.

IX. And be it enacted and ordained, That if any person shall alter, erase or deface the mark or brand of the inspector upon any barrel or half-barrel made, or shall mark or brand any barrel or half barrel of beef or pork which hath not been inspected, with any mark or brand similar to, or in imitation of the inspector's mark or brand, or alter the said inspector shall have passed any barrel or half barrel of beef or pork as merchantable shall pack into the cask which contains the same, any other salted provisions or after any barrel or half barrel of beef or pork shall be marked with the broad arrow, shall unpack and repack the same into other casks or packages for exportation or sale, such person shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars for every barrel or half barrel repacked as aforesaid.

X. And be it enacted and ordained, That all fines and forfeitures incurred under the seventh, eighth and ninth sections of this ordinance when recovered shall be appropriated as follows to wit; one half to the informer and the other half for the use of the city; and that other fines herein imposed shall be collected by the inspector of beef and pork for the use of the city.
