BOSTON, March 26.

FIRE.—Between the hours of four and
five, on Monday morning last, from some
cause unknown, a fire broke out in an out-
house attached to the dwelling house of
Robert Fletcher, esquire, in Pleasant-street,
which soon consumed the out-houses of this,
and the adjoining tenement occupied by Col.
William Gardner, and also a part of the
main building belonging to Mr. Fletcher.
Both the houses were rendered totally unin-
habitable. A considerable quantity of cloth-
ing and furniture was destroyed, and the
remainder greatly damaged in the removal.
The loss is estimated from three to four
thousand dollars. The house occupied by
Colonel Gardner, we understand, was insured.

NEW-YORK, March 30.

General Miranda.—By a gentleman just
arrived in this city from Trinidad, and
whose information is entitled to the fullest
credit, from his personal and particular ac-
quaintance with the officers and other prin-
ciple persons attached to the late expedition
of Miranda, we have the following informa-
tion: That general Miranda was at Trin-
idad when our informant left there—and
that he was in daily expectation of receiving
a reinforcement of between 8 and 10,000
men from England, under the order of ge-
neral Tucker, and which were said to have
sailed, but had been detained by adverse
winds; that on the arrival of these troops,
Miranda would immediately undertake a se-
cond expedition against the Spanish do-
minions in South America—and that it was
the concurrent opinion, of those qualified
to form a correct one, that with this respect-
able force the general would be able to
crown his enterprise with complete and
speedy success. Miranda had been appointed
to the rank of major-general by the En-
glish government. The failure of his late
attempt to liberate his countrymen from
Spanish oppression in that part of the world
was attributed wholly to the smallness of
the forces with which it was attempted, as
they did not altogether amount to 500 men.
Great numbers of the natives, and those
friendly to his project had frequently joined
the standard of Miranda, but could not be
induced to continue their fidelity, as they
could feel no certainty of protection from
such a handful of men, against the troops
and threatened vengeance of the Spanish
government.

The committee of enquiry into the gov-
ernor's conduct made report this morning
(March 30)—the charges are,
1. The use of the fac simile.
2. The appointment of Dr. Buchanan.
3. The removal of Dr. Reynolds.
4. The overtures made to Duane to with-
draw a criminal prosecution against him on
condition that he would discontinue his
suits against J. B. McKean and others.

5. Setting aside the election of Wolbert,
for which the committee think the governor
had not the shadow of a cause.
6. Sending a blank commission to be
filled up by J. B. McKean, to examine wit-
nesses respecting the contested election of
sheriff.
7. Issuing a warrant for the arrest of Ca-
brera, and afterwards dispensing with the
rules of the prison with respect to him.
These are the charges against the govern-
or; they are not made in this order, nor
indeed in any order, for the report which
is very long and full of the most gross and
vulgar abuse, is as destitute of method as
of decency. The principle burden of the
report is the refusal to commission Wolbert
and the severe flogging of Duane in 1799.

The report concludes with a resolution
that the governor be impeached of high
crimes and misdemeanors.
The report was made the order for Thurs-
day next, and the documents and testimony
taken by the committee ordered to be printed
for the use of the members.

Extract of a letter from Natchez, dated Fe-
bruary 15, 1807.

Judge Toulmin has committed Blenner-
hasset, an Irish gentleman, living on the
Ohio, to take his trial in the state of Vir-
ginia, where he resided, and where all the
substantial testimony which will fix illegal
intentions upon him is to be found. This,
however, is here considered as a most flag-
rant outrage, because his wife and child-
ren are here, and here it is alleged, he
ought to be tried. Although a prosecution
against him carried on here must of necessity
terminate in an idle parade.

Floyd and Ralstone, on the other hand,
wished to be tried in Kentucky and Indiana,
for there they live—but as the evidence
of their intention is to be found here in the
testimony of Doct. Carmichael, they have
been committed for trial in the Mississippi
territory, before a court to be summoned
specially by the governor—and which will
it is believed, have full jurisdiction under the
act of congress.

All of these gentlemen have been releas-
ed from confinement by a writ of habes cor-
pus and are now at large.

AMERICAN IMPROVEMENTS IN PHYSIC.

Dr. Thomas Beddoes, the celebrated En-
glish physician, is a great reader of Ameri-
can books. He has abandoned the old
school on the question of contagion, and
become a complete convert to the non-con-
tagiousness of yellow fever. In a letter to
one of his correspondents, he writes thus,
"I do not know any country in which
so much has been done for medicine as in Ameri-
ca; if you except the introduction of Vac-

cine inoculation, the most useful practice
ever fallen upon." Indeed it must be owned,
that since the appearance of the yellow
fever in 1791, and more especially since
the commencement of the first American
periodical work on medicine at New-York
in 1797, a new era has commenced in the
history of that profession.

Indian Language.

It is observed by John L. Gardiner, Esq.
in one of his communications to Doctor
Mitchell, that there are many words in the
Kistenuan and Algonquia languages ex-
actly like those of the Mantock Indians on the
easternmost extremity of Long-Island, and
which seem in part to justify an observation
of Mr. McKenzie in his journey from Cana-
da to the Pacific ocean, that there are three
distinct nations on the continent of Ameri-
ca. 1. The Esquimaux, who probably came
from Greenland. 2. The inhabitants on the
borders of the Pacific below the lati-
tude of 55 degrees north; and 3. Those
of the middle or middle region, whose
course has been from the Atlantic towards
the Pacific. Similarity of languages I con-
ceive to be a more certain method of trac-
ing the origin of savage nations, than simi-
larity of customs, which among uncivilized
nations are nearly the same from the ancient
Hebrew, to the modern nations of Ameri-
can Indians." In addition to the curious
and interesting publication on the native
American languages, made a few years ago
by Dr. Barton, the public may expect much
more information from the collated vocabu-
laries of the Aboriginal tongues, which will
appear in the narrative of captains Lewis and
Clark, in their late expedition across the
continent of North America, from the Po-
tomac to Columbia river, soon to be offered
to their impatient fellow citizens.

The following distressing occurrence
took place on the 24th of last month, at
the Laurel furnace, about fourteen miles
from this place: Mr. Daniel M'Collister,
after descending in the inside of the stack
of the Furnace, to bring out some tools
that had been there, became affected with
the fumes arising from the charcoal which
had been kindled a short time before, and
suddenly fell dead. Mr. Josiah Mitchell
then entered the stack to rescue Mr. M'Col-
lister, and also fell a victim to the same
deadly vapor. We are informed that the
spectators above did not perceive any signs
of life in Mr. M'Collister, when Mr. Mit-
chell went down, who had raised him up and
got him on his shoulder, when he instantly
fell. The father of Josiah Mitchell, was
then let down by a rope, and had convey-
ed Mr. M. a short distance up, when he
became so weak that he was obliged to let
him fall. Mr. Mitchell, the father, when
drawn up, was apparently lifeless but re-
covered in a short time.

tribute to merit to express our high satis-
faction at the proficiency they have made; and
to say that his plan, as novel to us as success-
ful in its operation, appears well calculated
to ground the young beginner in a thorough
knowledge of Orthography, to strengthen the
memory, to excite emulation, and to quicken
and mature the judgment of the Pupil.
