

SALEM, April 7.
Arrived, ship Messenger, Buffington, from Gibraltar, March 10, spoke ship *Poussin*, from Baltimore for Amsterdam, 3 days out.

BOSTON, March 7.
A tremendous gale was experienced at Dead 17th Feb. in which a great number of vessels were driven on shore, and others damaged. Great damage was likewise done in the Downs; out of near 150 vessels that were riding in the Downs, previous to the gale, not more than 30 remained. The shore was covered with wrecks.

The British frigate *Mediator*, arrived at Port Royal 10th March, with five prizes, among them the ship *George Washington*, of New-York, which she cut out of *Sama*, where she had been carried by a French privateer.

Markets dull at St. Jago de Cuba, 1st March; 30 per cent duties enforced on all articles imported. Several privateers were fitting out there.

Arrived, ship *Laura*, Blackler, from Madras and Cape Good Hope, 82 days.—Sailed in co. from Cape Good Hope, Jan. 15, brig *Plat*, Woodward, *Arabians*, from Baltimore for Batavia. Spoke, Feb. 15, Jan. 2, 10, long 32, ship *Erin*, Stevenson, for Baltimore, from Cape Good Hope. Spoke Dec. 5, an English whaler, who spoke on the 5th Nov. American ships *Comarces*, and *Industry*, had taken 23 whales, the *Commerce* was nearly loaded. March 5, lat. 20, 8, long. 58, schooner *C. Lambine*, 7 days from Norfolk for Antigua.

From London papers to March 9, received by the *Robert Burns*, and the *Cincinnati*:

LONDON, February 27.
Of the battle of Mohringen on the 25th ult. no further particulars worthy of notice have transpired. Accounts are, however, asserted to have been received from Hamburg through a very particular channel, of one day later date than any papers which have reached this country, in which it is stated, that on the 29th of January a general action took place between the grand French army on the Vistula and the allied forces of Russia and Prussia, in which the former were completely routed. It is added that, in consequence of this success, obtained over the enemy, the Austrians had attacked and defeated them on the side of Silesia. We should be happy to confirm this intelligence, but as we know not the authority on which it rests we can say nothing of its authenticity. The latter part appears to us so highly improbable as to throw a strong degree of doubt on the whole statement.

The Resistance frigate, captain Adam, from the West-Indies, is arrived at Portsmouth, having on board upwards of four million of dollars, which she brought from Vera Cruz, by permission of the British and Spanish governments. The Resistance sailed from Vera Cruz on the 14th of Jan. She continued off that port ten days, during which time no intercourse was permitted between the vessel and the shore.

February 28.
Letters received at Plymouth, dated in December last, from our fleet in the Dardanelles, state the following interesting particulars of the state of affairs at that period in Turkey: "The *Canopus*, 84, rear admiral Lewis, the *Endymion*, 41, and another frigate, are stationed directly opposite the Grand Seignior's seraglio, or palace. The *Thunderer*, 74, and *Standard*, 64, and two frigates, are anchored to command the passage of the Dardanelles. A few days before these letters came away, a Russian frigate, from the Mediterranean, passed the Dardanelles, without molestation from the Turkish batteries. But Sebastiani, the French intriguing ambassador from France to the Ottoman Porte, made a violent remonstrance at this frigate passing the Dardanelles; he could get no redress, as our envoy; Mr. Arbuthnot, gave in a representation of the business, and placed it in its proper point of view to the satisfaction of the Turkish government. There are 20 sail of the line and 15 frigates in the arsenal, but not above five of them half manned. Our ships are all in high order and discipline. The Turks treat our people with the greatest civility and attention. Refreshments of all kinds are sent on board our men of war. Our gallant admiral and his officers, and the captains and officers of the other British men of war, frequently dine on shore with Mr. Arbuthnot.

Prince of stocks at 1 o'clock.—Consols 52 1/2—reduced 51 6/3.
Yesterday morning the several gentlemen intending to bid for the present loan, waited upon the minister, for the purpose of having some preliminary conversation respecting the amount. The parties were informed, that the sum wanted immediately by way of loan, was 14,000,000; 12,000,000 of which was for England, charged upon the war taxes, with 10 per cent. interest and sinking fund, conformably to Lord H. Petty's new financial plan. 200,000,000 supplemental loan, with the usual sinking fund.—2,000,000 for the service of Ireland, to be raised in England on the Irish 3 1/2 per cent. In addition to the above, the ministers reserve to themselves the option of a vote of credit for 3,000,000, to be raised on exchequer bills.

Yesterday stated that Bonaparte had issued a fresh decree for the immediate sale of the confiscated property at Hamburg, and in the Hanseatic towns. We have since been

favoured with a copy of this unprincipled decree, of which the following is a translation: (COPY.)
Extract from the Minutes of the secretary of state, PALAIS, AT WARSAW, Jan. 25.
"Napoleon, emperor of the French and King of Italy.

"Since our decree of the 21st of Nov. ordering the confiscation of all English merchandise, in whatever hands they might be lodged."

"Since our decree of the 15th Dec. ordering that all English merchandise and property in Hamburg, and in Hanseatic towns should be sent to France, we have decreed, and do decree as follows:

Art. I. The merchandise subject to confiscation in pursuance of our decree of the 21st of November, shall be deposited in a special magazine, and placed under the care of a French agent.

Art. II. An inventory must be made and presented to our intendant general, who will immediately transmit it to our minister of Finance.

Art. III. The colonial produce, the articles chiefly necessary in the manufactures, the fine cloths, and the works in silks must be sent to France, subject to the authority of our minister of finance, & placed in his depository.

Art. IV. The goods, the spirits, cloths proper for the service of the army, and other articles capable of being rendered useful, must all be placed in the military magazine.

Art. V. The coarse description of merchandise, such as iron, wood, coals, beer, potash, &c. must be sold upon the spot where they have been sequestered.

Art. VI. The produce of sales in the territory occupied by the army must be placed in the fund of general contributions, and that of the sales in France in the bank.

Art. VII. Our minister of finance and our intendant general, are charged with the execution of the present decree.

PHILADELPHIA, April 14.
Accounts from below say, the brig *Ann*, Jane, for Bordeaux, lately driven ashore, our bay, being unloaded, was got off and being lashed between two shallops, was coming up, when another gale came on, and they were obliged to cut away her lashings, and she drove on Joe Flogger, where it is said she stove to pieces.

On Sunday last, at noon, it came on to rain and blow at E, extremely hard, which continued all Sunday night and Monday morning till 10 or 11 o'clock. From the violence of the wind, and its being direct on shore, it is to be feared we shall hear of much damage along our sea board.

The ship *Ann Alexander*, of New-York, from London, for Leghorn, is captured by a Spanish privateer.

NORFOLK, April 9.
We have it from good authority, that there are now in circulation in this place forged notes of the Baltimore bank of 100 dollars, signed James Cook, cashier, and George Vilmore, president; they can be detected by minutely investigating the cashier's name, which is badly executed.

A Kingston, (Jam.) paper of March 10, says, "Sir Alexander Cochrane has received accounts by the *Belleisle*, (dispatched by government) of the Rochefort squadron, consisting of 6 sail of line and two frigates, having put to sea; and by a small vessel, captured by the *Cerberus*, bound from L'Orient to Guadaloupe, with dispatches; it was ascertained that they were destined for Martinique. In consequence of which the admiral in the Northumberland, with the *Canada* and *Belleisle*, of 74 guns each, prince George of 98, and *Agamemnon* of 64, accompanied by the *Alexandria*, *Galatea*, and *Cerberus* frigates, and *Dart* and *Woolverine* sloops of war, were to sail from Carlisle bay, (Barbados) on the 1st inst. for the purpose of cruising off Martinique, to endeavour to fall in with the enemy.

"On the 3d instant, off Cape Tiburon, the *Dunrobin Castle*, captain Cooper, from Norfolk, engaged a Spanish privateer sch'r of 14 guns, which she beat off without any loss on her side, but captain Cooper thinks the privateer must have lost a good many hands, as she received the contents of four 12 pound carronades, loaded with grape, when close alongside of his ship; at any rate the *Dons* thought them rather serious, for they cut sweeps and pulled off."

The *Patriot*, French 74, got under way from Annapolis on Saturday, and came to anchor 12 miles below.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

By this day's mail we have received New York papers, which state, that by the *Robert Burns* and the *Cincinnati* they have received London papers to March 2.

Although these papers afford nothing later from the continent than the Russian official account, as published in the *Gazette* of Monday; yet that account is given, and thus all that we have published is confirmed.

The irreconcilable difference between the French and the Russian and English accounts, produces the impression that both stories are exaggerated. The bulletins declare the Russians to have fled 100 leagues beyond the Vistula! monstrous absurdity! Beyond what part of the Vistula did they fly 300 miles? and in the neighborhood of the Vistula, between Mohringen and Thorn, they defeated Bernadotte—deduced from the Russian statement—and in the next breath they have fled 100 leagues, over ground covered three feet with snow, during which retreat they must have dragged more than a hundred cannon, for the French allow there were 300 on both sides, and they won 45.

It does not appear, in official form, from the whole accounts, that there has yet been a general engagement. But this must soon take place; and if it should not, a few such victories as the French have gained, will, in their own estimation, be "an event (to use the emperor's language) such as was not expected."

The article from Constantinople is important at this crisis.

ORDERS OF COUNCIL.
GEORGE R.

L. S.—Additional instruction to the commanders of our ships of war and privateers. Given at our court, at St. James', the 4th day of February, 1807, in the forty-seventh year of our reign.

Our will and pleasure is, that you do not interrupt neutral vessels, laden with cargoes consisting of the articles herein after enumerated, coming for importation to any port of our United Kingdom, (provided they are not coming from any part in a state of strict and rigorous blockade.) And in case any such vessel so coming with such articles, shall be brought for adjudication before our high court of admiralty, or any court of vice-admiralty. We hereby direct that the same shall be forthwith liberated, upon a claim being given by order on behalf, of the merchant or merchants, to whom such articles are coming for importation.

Enumeration of Articles.—Grain, viz. Corn, Meal and Flour, (if importable according to the provisions of the Corn laws) Rice, Spanish Wool, Mohair Yarn, Madder and Madder Roots, Smalts, Sumack, Argol, Galls, Cream of Tartar, Safflower, Valonia, Brimstone, Spanish Wine, Indigo, Saffron, Verdigrise, Cochineal, Orchilla Weed, Cork, Olive Oil, Fruit, Ashes, Juniper Berries, Barilla, Organzine thorn and raw Silk, (not being of the production of the East-Indies or China,) Quicksilver, Bullion, coined and uncoined, Goat, Kid, Lamb Skins, Rags, Oak Bark, Flax, Seeds, Oil of Turpentine, Pitch, Hemp, Timber, Fir, Oak, Oak Plank, Mast, and Spars.

An additional instruction to the commanders of our ships of war and privateers. Given at our court at St. James', the 11th day of February, 1807, in the 47th year of our reign.

Our will and pleasure is, that all British vessels which have cleared out from any of the ports of our United Kingdom to Buenos Ayres and the River Plata, may be permitted either to proceed without interruption to any port of the Island of St. Domingo, not in the immediate possession, or under the controul of France or Spain, there to dispose of their cargoes, and to lade produce in return, and to carry the same to any port of our United Kingdom, or to transport their cargoes on board neutral vessels, and to send the same for sale to any hostile colony, and to bring back returns on board such neutral vessels to any port of our United Kingdom.
