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BY THIS DAY'S MAIL.

NEW-YORK, April 20.

Cleared, Rising States, Burrows, Charleston; Fairplay, Grennells, Alexandria; Columbia, Southwork, Norfolk.

Yesterday was a very great day of arrivals—nearly 60 sail of valuable vessels came in—and many more below last night, with a fine breeze from the southward.

From London. By the ship Gold Hunter, captain Vose, in 27 days pass., we have received London papers and Lloyd's lists to the evening of the 20th of March. They contain nothing later from the armies in Poland. They state that the Russian army, under the command of general Michelson, was marching strait to Constantinople, and is already at Georgia, beyond Widdin, where it engaged a Turkish corps, and killed 8000 men, but it sustained itself a loss of 3000. The Turks are preparing for war with as much activity and vigor as so weak a government is capable of; but long before the preparations are completed the Russians will have over run the empire, and have fixed their standards on the walls of Constantinople.

The papers also state a change in the English administration. On this subject the Courier of the 20th of March says: "On Wednesday, before his majesty left town, a message was transmitted to lords Eldon and Hawkesbury, commanding their attendance at Windsor yesterday morning. Their lordships attended his majesty, and upon their return they waited upon the duke of Portland, who, with the before-mentioned lords, and lords Lowther and Melbourne, were to frame a new administration. As soon as a list of the new ministry has been prepared, it will be laid before his majesty, but the arrangements are not expected to be completed before the end of the next week. His majesty will then cause it to be intimated to the present ministers, that he has no occasion for their further services; for they give out openly, that they are determined not to resign, but to remain in till they are turned out. The king having consented to a partial indulgence to Catholics by extending the Irish act of 1793 to Great-Britain, ministers made use of this consent to surprise the king's conscience into a total repeal of the Test laws, as far as the army and navy are concerned. Papists were to be our generals on the staff, our masters-general of the ordnance, our commanders in chief, the captains and admirals of our fleets; in short, they were to be trusted with the full power of the sword. His majesty having gained information of this attempt to swindle his consent to a repeal of the test laws, expressed his displeasure, and his determination to resist this dishonest attack upon his conscience. Ministers being thus detected and exposed, propose to his majesty the retraction of their measure, to which his majesty, with the utmost condescension and forgiveness, consents, provided they will not agree to force the measure upon him again, or make a second attempt to surprise his conscience. To this stipulation ministers refuse to consent, and acquiesce the public they have taken their line; they shall not resign, his majesty may turn them out if he pleases. The charge, therefore, which some supposed would be partial, keeping in the Sidmouths, who are known to be adverse to the Catholic question, and even the prince's friends, will be complete. The Sidmouths will go out as well as the Grenvilles and the Foxites. Lists of the new ministers are already handed about. The following has been transmitted to us; we do not pledge ourselves that it is authentic: "First lord of the treasury, duke of Portland. Chancellor of the exchequer, lord Castlereagh. Foreign secretary, lord Hawkesbury. War secretary, Mr. Yorke. Lord chancellor, lord Eldon. First lord of the admiralty, lord Melbourne. President of the council, lord Camden. Privy seal, earl of Westmoreland. Master general of ordnance, earl Mulgrave. President of board control, earl of Chatham. Treasurer of the navy, Mr. Rose. Joint-paymasters, Mr. Long. Secretary at war, Mr. Dundas. Attorney-general, Mr. Percival. Solicitor general, Mr. V. Gibbs. Secretaries of the treasury, Mr. Huskisson, Mr. Sturgis Bourn. Lord-lieutenant of Ireland, earl Hardwicke, or Lord Albercorn. Chancellor of Ireland, lord Redesdale.

FEDERAL GAZETTE.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 22.

Majority in the British House of Commons for the immediate Abolition of the Slave Trade, 158.

The schrs. Hercules, Felt, Osborn, and sloop Criterion, Drinkwater, all from Baltimore, have arrived at Salem.

The ship Spartan, of Baltimore, sailed from Gibraltar, on the 28th January, for Malta with stores for the American squadron.

The ship Jane, McCarthy, has arrived at Leghorn, from Baltimore.

Ship New Guide, Creagh, & brig Chance, Montserrat, were at N. Orleans 29th March.

Brig Joseph, Pierce, fr. Baltimore for Lisbon, was spoke 10th April, lat. 37, long. 69, 30.

Captain Smith (arrived at Philadelphia, from Liverpool) spoke on the 7th April, schr. Harriet, Chase, from Jamaica, bound to North Carolina, out 31 days, then in lat. 36, 39, N. long. 63, W. in a distressed situation, being short of sails, spars and provisions, having been blown off the coast several times, and intended making the first port.

Captain Hughes (arrived at Philadelphia) from St. Thomas, on the 4th April, lat. 36, 30, long. 70, in a heavy gale of wind, passed a long, deep-vaisted, sharp, black brig—she had her mainsail and boom carried away; her other sails all handed, and spars standing. She was lying at the mercy of the sea, having had her decks swept, and, as he believes, not a man on board; it blowing hard he could make no other observations. A few days before, he saw a brig standing for the Cape of Delaware, which he believes was the above brig.

A New-York paper of the 20th instant reports 60 arrivals at that port the day before—Amongst which were,

Virginia, Fredericksburg, Va.; sloop Fellowship, Savannah; schr. Concord, Richmond; brig Washington, George-Town, S. C.; brig Olive, Charleston; brig Georgia, Savannah.

LONDON, March 14.
The Juno, Thomson, master, which has arrived in the river, from Memel, has bro't a copy of the public notification of the battle of Eylau, which was posted in that town, announcing the result to the public. The following is a translation:
"The governor and chamber of magistracy have to congratulate their fellow citizens that official accounts have this day been received, that after repeated battles from the 3d to the 9th, the combined armies of Russia and Prussia had obtained a complete victory over the French. The result of the victory had been TWENTY Eagles; fourteen of which had been awarded to general Benningsen and the Russian army; the remaining six had been presented to his majesty the King of Prussia. The French had lost twenty thousand men, who were dead on the field of battle."

PROCLAMATION.
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The contest had been so obstinately maintained on both sides, that both French and Russians had refused to accept of any quarter from each other. A body of 1500 French, who had been cut off during the battle of the 7th, had been surrounded on the 8th by the whole of the Russian army; they refused to lay down their arms or accept of quarter; but Gen. Benningsen, after a sharp attack, made them sensible of their fruitless resistance and ruinous desperation, and induced them to surrender at discretion. These are the only prisoners taken. The Russians remained encamped on the field of battle on the 10th; the French had retreated two leagues. General Benningsen expected a strong reinforcement of Cossacks, and the junction of the Silesian levy, when, it is supposed, that he will pursue his victory.

"By order of the Chamber of Magistracy, "H. KLOPSTOCK."

The above notification accounts for the dreadful slaughter on that day, by stating, not that neither army would give, but that both refused to take quarter. That is, they both fought with such desperation as to preclude all thought of surrendering.

Bermuda, April 9.

Since he has received the account that the American treaty with England is not favorably received, it has had great effect with the judge, and indeed he condemns almost every thing that is worth having; their cruizers send in all they can find; there are two vessels sent here outward bound, one from New-York, and one from Alexandria; there are here fourteen sail of American vessels detained and condemned."
