An officer came on board, examined the ship's papers, and ordered the crew up for inspection. He then desired Allen Pinkham, one of the crew to repair on board the schooner; alleging that his name was not sold right in the roll of the ship. Captain D. remonstrated on the impropriety of such conduct, assured the officer that he had known Pinkham from his infancy; that he was a native of Bristol, in Massachusetts, and an apprentice, and produced his indentures and protection; but to no purpose. Captain D. then applied to the captain of the frigate, who sanctioned the proceedings of the officer, ordered Pinkham with his clothing on board the schooner, and captain D. to proceed on his voyage.

The two ships at anchor off the bar yesterday, were the British ship Mercury, Barrows for Liverpool, and the ship Belfast, English, for Cowes and a market; both vessels having struck on the bar yesterday morning, and lost their rudders. These ships seem to be exceedingly unfortunate; as a few weeks since, having called here to return; and the Belfast having got upon the bar in coming in last winter, when she lost her rudder, and received other damage.

Fire.—Two houses were burnt in Richmond on 22d April.

The Louisa, and the Eleonora, from Baltimore, arrived at Amsterdam Feb. 14 and 23. Schr. Betsey, Race, 15 days from St. Bartholomews for Baltimore, was spoke April 12, in lat. 30. 46.

The Juno, Fisher, of Savannah, from Africa, with 450 slaves, is taken into Martinique.

Mr. Forbes, the American Consul in Hamburg, has made it known to his countrymen, that American vessels have full liberty to sail from the Elbe, in ballast, or with such merchandise as is not prohibited, certified as such by him. The English cruisers permit American vessels to enter the Elbe, on like conditions.

A number of gentlemen, interested in the preservation of property, having expressed a desire to see a portion of the water which is now bringing into the city, destined for the use of the public in time of fire, have been given to understand that the thing would be done, although from inattention in the council, no such clause or condition is expressed in the ordinance in favor of the water company.

It is the opinion of many, that it would be prudent and patriotic, to refrain from taking the water until the company, by some official act, shall have secured to the citizens a portion of water gratis, for the express purpose of putting out fires.

COUNTERFEITS.

We have seen several counterfeit notes of ten dollars of the Philadelphia Bank in circulation. The paper on which they are done is considerably thicker and rather more of the white than the genuine note. Upon a close examination, the whole of the execution appears coarse and clumsy, and has the appearance of being done with a pencil. In the word *promise* the letter is larger than any of the others. The lines in the Pennsylvania arms, are evidently not engraved, but done with the pencil or pen—and in the margin of the note the deception is particularly striking. The signatures are heavy and look as if copied and run over with the pen.

Aaron Burr. We understand, that the marshal of Virginia has sent on subpoenas to both sides of the Ohio, in the neighborhood of Blennerhassett's island, to collect such testimony as relates to the armed association of men which is said to have taken place on that island. If it be obtained, it will no doubt be exhibited before the next term of the federal court of this district, on the trial of A. Burr.

It is also understood, that blank subpoenas have been sent on to Washington, to summon such other witnesses as may reside beyond the limits of this district. That this process will be served on general Eaton, commodore Truxton, and every other witness, who lives within the Atlantic States and can be here at the time of the trial, there can be little doubt. But it is for the same reason uncertain, whether the summons can embrace gen. Wilkinson and the other witnesses, who are now at New Orleans and on the western waters.

By Authority. AN ORDINANCE

To license and regulate Auctions within the city of Baltimore and the precincts thereof.

I. *Be it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore*, That no person or persons shall exercise the trade or business of an auctioneer, by selling of any property, real or personal, by any mode of sale whereby the best or highest bidder is deemed the purchaser, within the city of Baltimore or the precincts thereof, unless he shall have previously obtained from the mayor a license under the seal of the corporation, under the penalty of five hundred dollars for every such sale: *Provided*, That nothing in this ordinance contained shall extend to any sale by auction of property, real or personal, made pursuant to or in execution of any order, decree sentence or judgment of any court of the United States, or of either of them, or made in virtue of any distress for rent or other cause for which a distress is allowed by law, or made by or on behalf of executors or administrators, as such. And the mayor shall, upon the application of any citizen or citizens of Baltimore, or the precincts thereof, complying with the conditions hereinafter mentioned, grant a license for the term of one year to exercise the trade or business of an auctioneer; and for said license the person or persons obtaining the same shall pay or cause to be paid therefor to the register, for the use of the city, the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars. And no such license shall be granted or renewed, until the person or persons applying for the same shall have given bond to the mayor and city council of Baltimore, with sureties to the satisfaction of the mayor, in the penal sum of thirty thousand dollars, current money, with condition that he or they shall duly pay and satisfy all just claims that may be against him or them, as auctioneer or auctioneers, and will faithfully execute the office and employment of an auctioneer, and in all things well and faithfully perform the several duties required by this ordinance.

II. *And be it enacted and ordained*, That no auctioneer or auctioneers, licensed as aforesaid, shall demand or receive from any person, directly or indirectly, for his or their services, a commission exceeding the rate of two dollars for every hundred dollars of the purchase-money arising by the sale at auction of any property, real or personal, ex-

clusive of all duties, except as is hereinafter mentioned.

III. *And be it enacted and ordained*, That any person desirous of pursuing the business of an auctioneer, for the sole purpose of vending horses and carriages, may apply to the mayor for a special license for that purpose, and the mayor shall thereupon grant such special license, upon the terms and conditions aforesaid: *Provided*, that the penal sum of the bond given by such person shall be one thousand dollars, and the person obtaining such license shall pay therefor fifty dollars; and that such auctioneer shall be entitled to receive for his services a commission not exceeding the rate of three dollars for every hundred dollars of the purchase-money arising from such sale, exclusive of duties. And every such auctioneer shall and he is hereby directed to keep a registry of all horses that shall or may be sold by him, specifying the description of every horse, the sum of money for which he may have been sold, and also the name and residence of the seller and of the purchaser; which registry shall at the end of each and every year be by him deposited for safe-keeping with the register of the city, with the oath or affirmation thereto annexed of such auctioneer of the truth thereof.

IV. *And be it enacted and ordained*, That any person or persons desirous of pursuing the business of auctioneers, for the sole purpose of selling books, maps or prints, may apply to the mayor for special license for that purpose; and the mayor shall, upon such person or persons complying with the conditions hereinafter mentioned, grant such special license for the term of one year, to exercise the trade or business of an auctioneer, by selling of books, maps or prints by auction, and the person or persons obtaining such license shall pay therefor fifty dollars; and no such license shall be granted or renewed until the person or persons applying for the same shall have given bond to the mayor and city council of Baltimore, with sureties to the satisfaction of the mayor, in the penal sum of three thousand dollars current money, with condition that he or they shall duly pay and satisfy all just claims that may be against him or them as auctioneer or auctioneers, and will faithfully execute the office and employment aforesaid; and no auctioneer, for the purpose aforesaid, shall demand and receive from any person, directly or indirectly, for his or their services, a commission exceeding the rate of ten dollars for every hundred dollars of the purchase money from such sales, exclusive of all duties.

V. *And be it enacted and ordained*, That any person or persons desirous of pursuing the business of an auctioneer of household furniture and wearing apparel, which hath been previous to the sale thereof in actual use, may apply to the mayor for special license for that purpose; and the mayor shall thereupon grant such special license, restricting such sales to be made by day-light only, upon the terms and conditions aforesaid: *provided*, that the penal sum of the bond given by such person shall be three thousand dollars, and the persons obtaining such license, shall pay therefor one hundred dollars, and that such auctioneer shall be entitled to receive for his services, a commission not exceeding the rate of four dollars clear of all duties, for every hundred dollars of the purchase money arising from each sale; and the auctioneers who hold license authorizing them to sell any goods, wares and merchandize, may and are hereby authorized to charge a commission of four per centum clear of all duties, on all household furniture and wearing apparel aforesaid, sold by them; and upon the sale of books, maps or prints, may charge a commission of ten per centum clear of all duties, any thing contained herein to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. *And be it enacted and ordained*, That every auctioneer shall, out of the monies arising from each and every sale, return and pay to the register for the use of the corporation, at the rate of one dollar for every hundred dollars, on the amount of all the sales made by him or them, and shall once in every three months, on oath or affirmation, account for, and pay the same to the register; and to the end, that such accounts may be accurately kept and rendered, it is hereby made the duty of every auctioneer to enter from day to day, as often as any sale shall be made, in a book to be kept for that purpose, the amount of the respective sales made by him or them, which book shall upon application be submitted for examination to the mayor, and for every refusal to comply with such request, he, she or they shall forfeit and pay the sum of five thousand dollars.

VII. *And be it enacted and ordained*, That if any person shall sustain any injury or damage from any act or default of an auctioneer contrary to the tenor of his obligation given as aforesaid, then and in such case such person shall have right to institute a suit, or suits, at law or in equity, upon the obligations given as aforesaid, as the case may require; in the name of the mayor and city council of Baltimore, in the proper court or courts, and the same to prosecute to the final end thereof for the use and benefit of such persons, in which suits the person or persons injured as aforesaid, shall be entitled to obtain and recover a verdict and judgment, to the amount of the injury or damage he shall make appear to have been by him sustained, or suffered as aforesaid. And in case any security or securities on bond given for the faithful performance of the duty of any auctioneer or auctioneers licensed in virtue of this ordinance, shall die, remove from the county of Baltimore, or become insolvent, the mayor shall and he is hereby authorized and empowered to demand other

security or securities for the same, and in case of neglect or refusal, the license so granted, shall form thenceforth become, and is hereby declared to be, null and void, to all intents and purposes, as if the same had never been granted.
