BY THIS DAY'S MAIL, N. W. YORK, April 24.

The ship Eliza, captain Smith, left Bordeaux on the 25th of March. We have received by her our regular file of French papers to the 20th, inclusive. They add to our former stock of intelligence, two more bulletins (the 63d and 64th) from the grand army. The most interesting circumstances being detailed in that of the 64th, we have confined our translations for the present to that article only. When the great pressure of local business shall begin to subside, the 63d will be given to complete our series.

SIXTY-FOURTH BULLETIN OF THE GRAND ARMY. Osterode, 2d March, 1847. The city of Elbing furnished great resources to the army. There was found in it a great quantity of wine and brandy. The country of the lower Vistula is very fertile. The ambassadors of Constantinople and of Persia, have entered Poland, and approach Warsaw.

After the battle of Eylau, the emperor passed every day several hours on the field of battle. A horrid spectacle, but duty rendered it necessary. It required much labor to bury all the dead. A great number of Russian officers were found with their decorations. It appears there was among them a prince Repnin. Forty-eight hours after the battle, more than 600 wounded Russians remained on the ground that they had not been able to carry off. Brandy and bread was brought them, and they were successively transported to the hospitals.

Let one figure to himself upon the surface of a square league, 9 or 10,000 dead bodies, 4 or 5,000 horses slain, lines of Russian knapsacks, pieces of muskets and swords, the earth covered with bullets—Obus's munitions, 24 pieces of cannon, near which were the bodies of the conductors killed at the moment they were making efforts to drag them off, all which appeared more forcibly upon a ground of snow. A spectacle calculated to inspire princes with the love of peace and the horrors of war.

The 5,000 that we had wounded have been all filed off or sent to Thorn and our hospitals on the left bank of the Vistula upon sleds. The surgeons have remark'd with surprise that the fatigue of this conveyance has not injured the wounded.

Here are some details of the battle of Braunsberg. Gen. Dupont marched against the enemy in two columns. Gen. Brayan, who commanded the right column, met the enemy at Hagen, and forced him in the river, which runs in front of this village. The left column pushed the enemy upon Villenberg, and the whole of the division did not delay rallying out of the wood. The enemy, driven from his first position, was obliged to fall back upon the river which covers the city of Braunsberg; at first he stood firm, but general Dupont marched up to him, overtook him by a brisk career, and entered with him into the city, which was strewn with the Russian dead.

The 9th of light infantry, the 93d, and the 9th of the line, which composed this division, have signalized themselves. Gens. Barois, Labrossaye, col. Semele of the 24th of the line—col. Manner of the 9th of light infantry—the chief of battalion, Bouge, of the 39d of the line, and the chief of a squadron Hubnet of the 8th of hussars, had merited particular eulogiums.

Since the arrival of the French army on the Vistula, we have taken from the Russians in the affairs of Pultusk and of Golyneen 89 pieces of cannon, at the battle of Bergfried 4 pieces; at the retreat of D'Alenstein 5 pieces; at the battle of Deppen 16 pieces, at the battle of Hoff 12 pieces; at the battle of Eylau 24 pieces, at the battle of Braunsberg 16 pieces; at the battle of Ostrolenka 9 pieces; total 175 pieces of cannon.

The remark has been made on this subject that the emperor has never lost any cannon in the armies which he has commanded when in the first campaigns of Italy and Egypt, or in those of the army of reserve, whether in those of Austria and Moravia or in those of Prussia and Poland.

PARIS, March 14. The memorable battle of Eylau has confounded the attempts made by the Russians to disturb our winter quarters; and the battles of the 16th and 22d February, have finished to entirely disconcert their projects.—H. S. H. arch-chancellor prince of the empire has embraced the occasion of these fortunate successes to supplicate H. M. empress and queen to approve of a festival, which she has condescended to accept of. This festival is to take place to-morrow, 15th, at the Palace of the Great Elector, that her majesty the queen of Naples has kindly ceded for that purpose.

Several French who were in Russia have quitted that empire to avoid the vexatious obligations prescribed by the Ukase relating to them. Already, many have passed by Nantz, in their way to Paris. M. Marten, French consul in Moldavia, has also passed through the same city, returning to Paris.

By the ship Eliza, in 29 days from Bordeaux, we have French accounts several days later from the army than those via England. But we find no news in them; no exultation on account of French victories. This circumstance is a proof that the French army has, at least, been "worsted."
