

King, that on or before Wednesday next he will be able to submit, for his gracious approbation, the new arrangement which he is now forming.

Among the noblemen and gentlemen who dined with the duke of Portland, were, the Earl of Cambren, Lord Hawkesbury, Lord Castlereagh, Lord Eldon, Mr. Rose, Mr. Canning, Mr. Sturges Bourne.

Mr. Sheridan, on being arrested by the sergeant at arms for non-attendance in his place, on a call of the house, good-humoredly exclaimed, "This is rather too hard, to be turned out of place, and taken into custody, on one and the same day."

No mails have yet arrived from the continent, but some accounts have been brought by ships from the coast of Holland, which state, that a few days since a report prevailed at Rotterdam, of a great battle having been fought on the 6th of February, in which the Russians were repulsed with great loss; but that, to secure the repose of the French army during the remainder of the bad weather, the cantonments have been considerably withdrawn from their advanced position, as being too much exposed to the repeated tho' fruitless attacks of the "barbarians." This rumor of a battle on the 26th, perhaps relates to that of the 16th, the French account of which has already appeared. Of the retreat of the enemy, we have little doubt.

We are anxious for the arrival of intelligence from the continent; for some great and important change in the state of affairs must soon take place. The negotiations at Warsaw must end in some positive determination. Bonaparte will never suffer Austria to remain in her present indecision. In his present situation, all his movements are necessarily cramped by the apprehension, at least, of her possible hostility. A movement of the Austrian army might in a moment cut off his supplies; and, in the present circumstances of the campaign, endanger the very existence of his army. Is it credible, therefore, that Bonaparte, with his characteristic arrogance and ambition, will suffer the future continuance of this state of things? What, then, will be his course? He will endeavor either to bribe Austria, or what is perhaps still worse, to awe or corrupt her councils.

It is indeed no less lamentable than true, that the French intrigues have obtained a most unnatural prevalence even in the very cabinet of Austria. It was so in Prussia, and hence the alternate resolution and timidity of that unhappy government. There was an opposition, which was powerful enough to render the best resolutions nugatory, if not to procure the execution of the worst. We much fear—we say it with regret, but we do not say it without sufficient grounds, that there is something of the same kind in the present Austrian cabinet. The archduke Charles, the best hope of Europe and of his own house, has too long and too successfully been opposed by this secret party. We have only to express our hopes, that he may finally prevail over it. The late accounts received by government are not very favorable.

LONDON, March 22. The blockade of Trieste has been raised for the present, in consequence of a conference between the governor and the British commodore; the port, however, continues shut against the English and Russian vessels, and if that unwarrantable system of exclusion is still persisted in, the blockade will be of course resumed.

FEDERAL GAZETTE.

MONDAY, APRIL 27.

A schooner, Baltimore built, from St. Domingo, was taken at the mouth of St. Thomas, on the 20th March.

The Susan and Williams, and the Harriot, from Baltimore, arrived at Boston, 20th April.

April 3, was spoke ship Nancy, 22 days from Baltimore for Liverpool.

On Sunday last, an ark in descending the Conewago Falls, in the river Susquehanna, having 30 barrels of flour, 1000 bushels of wheat, and 10 men on board, was unfortunately shattered to pieces. The flour and wheat were altogether lost, and two of the ark's crew drowned; the rest saved themselves on the broken remains of the ark.

Governor Hyslop, of the island of Trinidad, issued his proclamation, on the 4th of March last, appointing an inspector and weigh master, of all articles of importation which are sold by weight or measure. All articles of American produce are to be by him inspected immediately after entry; and his award is to be conclusive in all cases where the amount does not exceed 50 dollars—if over that, an appeal may be made to the governor and council. Merchandise to be sold must be 3/4 of an inch thick; plank 1 1/2 inches; cypress shingles, 17 inches long and 4 broad; hogheads staves, 3 feet 5 inches long, 3 inches wide, and 3/4 of an inch thick; Boston shingles, 19 inches long and 3 wide; hhd hoops, 12 to 14 feet long, 2 1/2 in a bundle; all which fall short of this description will not be deemed merchantable. Barrels of flour must contain at least 195 lb. and barrels of provision 190 lb. net to be merchantable. Articles imported from the U. States are hereafter to pay a duty of one shilling per ton; and to be rated as follows: 600 feet of boards, 1 in; 800 southern shingles, one ton; 4000 Boston shingles, one ton; 2000 clapboards, one ton; 700 dressed or 6000 wrought staves, one ton; 29 hhd. shooks, one ton; 10 barrels of beef, pork or flour one ton.

The cargo of the Prussian ship Louise, Heys, captured on her passage from Baltimore to Amsterdam, was restored to the claimants 3d March, by the court of admiralty, on the payment of the captors expenses incurred in taking examinations and depositions.

The Algerines, who were for a short time at war with the Russians, have now made peace with them, and declared war against France. [Boston paper.]

DUTCH EXPEDITION.

The expedition which sailed from Holland the latter part of February, and was compelled to return by bad weather, was under the charge of general Daendels, and supposed to be bound to the East Indies. It consisted of four frigates and several transports, all full of troops. Stores, it is said, had been previously sent off in American bottoms, hired for the purpose. One of the frigates has been lost.
