the first effects of a liberal education is to  
know how to appreciate virtue and merit.

BERLIN, March 5.

The French grand army is in winter quar-  
ters behind the Passarge (a small river which  
empties into the Vistula, a few miles south  
of Thorn.) Its left wing leans on Marien-  
werder and Elbing.

A Russian division, 10,000 strong, hav-  
ing advanced against Braunsberg, at the sum-  
mit of our winter cantonments gen. Du-  
pont was ordered to attack it; which he did  
on the 26th February, and obliged it to re-  
cross the Passarge, with the loss of 16 pieces  
of cannon, two stands of colors, and 6000  
prisoners. Our loss in killed is not worth  
mentioning.

Marshal Augereau, who is wounded, has  
obtained leave to go to Paris; and marshal  
Massena commands at Warsaw, vice Lan-  
nes, who is ill.

## BY THIS DAY'S MAILS.

BOSTON, April 22.

We yesterday were favored with a Dutch  
(Antwerp) paper of the 18th of March. It  
was obtained by the Dromo from a vessel  
spoken at sea, bound from Antwerp to Phila-  
delphia.

The French grand army had gone into  
winter-quarters behind the Passarge, a river  
which runs into the Vistula, not far from  
Thorn; a position from 80 to 100 miles in  
the rear of Blyau. But the French did not  
find repose there; and two battles had been  
fought with the advanced corps of the Rus-  
sians, in the vicinity of the French canton-  
ments. The Russians were repulsed with  
considerable loss. The fact, however, proves  
that the Russians had pursued Bonaparte in  
his retreat from Blyau, and had even crossed  
the Passarge to annoy him. Savary's (late  
Lannes's) corps had also been ordered into  
winter-quarters. We learnt yesterday, by  
an arrival from Rotterdam, that the great  
loss and severe rebuff the French met at Bly-  
au, were the theme of general conversation at  
Rotterdam.

NEW YORK, April 27.

The news by the New-Packet, Trott,  
28 days from Liverpool, is no later than  
that that by the Palmyra, at this port.

BATON, March 7.

Another hostile column having arrived at  
Feterwald, on the 25th gen. Bellir attacked  
it, repulsed it, and took 400 prisoners,  
among whom was gen. Von Koiff, his staff,  
and other officers. The enemy's party, at  
first consisting of 10 battalions, was reduced  
to about 1600.

General Dombrowski, in marching against  
Dantzie, met the Prussian garrison thereof  
near Pirschau, threw it into disorder, took  
600 prisoners and 6 pieces of cannon; and  
pursued it several hours—Marshal Lefebvre  
has joined with his corps, which with the  
Saxons, is destined to blockade Dantzie.

Arrived, the British Packet Duke of  
Kent, captain Lawrence, with the March  
mail. She left Balmouth the 10th, and is  
6 days from Halifax.

The ship Susan, Howard, in 42 days from  
Amsterdam. Brig Taylor, of Charles-  
ton, had been ashore, unloaded, and then  
reloading.

from Bristol. March 29, lat. 47, spoke

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.

Last evening arrived the ship Frederick  
Augustus, captain Potter, 29 days from Am-  
sterdam, who informs, that it was current  
at the time of his sailing, that on or about  
the 1st of March the Russians had gained  
considerable advantage of the French, who,  
with the emperor at their head, had charged  
the Russians seven times, and were as often  
repulsed; that the French had retreated 100  
Dutch miles, and left the Russians in pos-  
session of the winter quarters, lately occu-  
pied by the French. Captain P. left at Am-  
sterdam, the brig Isabella, Crane, of this  
port; the Juno, of Norfolk; and ship Clyde,  
Alcorn, of New-York, all discharging; the  
Eleanor, Taylor, to sail the day after him for  
New-York, and the ship Hardware, Laur, of  
New-York, ballasting for Hull.

The above article is more illustrative of  
the pressure of the Russian arms, than any  
thing that has yet transpired.

To the printer of the Georgetown (S. C.)  
Gazette.

SIR,  
Passing through this place, on my way  
to the Federal City, I happened to take up  
one of your newspapers, and was astonished  
by the absurd and notorious falsehoods which  
Mr. Perkins has introduced into his account  
of what he terms the arrest of Col. Burr.  
I recollect with the col. from Natchez, was  
with him till within half an hour separated  
from him with an intention of rejoining  
him in a few hours. I am able therefore to  
contradict the above falsehoods, from my  
own knowledge, and being able, I feel it an  
act of justice to do so. Colonel Burr was  
neither in disguise, nor was he going to the  
Spaniards. His dress was altogether as  
usual except that he had on a pair of  
coarse overhaits to preserve his pantaloons  
from being soiled. He rode on one  
of the best geldings in the Western coun-  
try; he was in the high road to Carson's  
ferry on the Tombigbee river, which is the  
direct and indeed the only road through  
Georgia, &c. to the Federal City, to which  
place he was proceeding, and was accompa-  
nyed by Mr. Brightwell, the sheriff of Wash-  
ington county, in the Mississippi territory,  
whom he had engaged to pilot him as far as  
the ferry, where he intended to wait the  
arrival of his servants and baggage who were  
at some distance behind. It was in this  
situation he was stopped by Mr. Perkins  
and Lieut. Gaines, with 8 or 10 men, with-  
out the color of any civil process whatever,  
and forcibly hurried on a journey of more  
than a thousand miles, those who had seized  
him, carefully avoiding every town and vil-  
lage, lest their conduct might be examined  
into by some judicial power.

When col. Burr voluntarily surrendered  
himself at the mouth of the Bayou Pierre,  
he entered into recognizance, himself in the  
sum of five thousand dollars, and two sure-  
ties in the like sum, to appear before the  
district court which was to be held shortly  
afterwards, to answer to any bills that might  
be found against him. He did appear, and  
the grand jury found no bills against him.  
The col. then demanded a release from his  
recognizance, which the court refused.—  
Knowing the refusal to be illegal, he trou-  
bled himself no further about the recognizance  
but set out on a day or two afterwards, as I ob-  
served for the Federal City.

I have been informed by a gentleman who  
left Natchez some time after he, that judge  
Rodey thinking the bond which had been  
given by colonel Burr and his sureties could  
not be recovered, had undertaken to draw a  
new bond, which he saved these gentlemen  
the trouble of signing, signing it for them;  
and had surrendered this new bond to the  
governor as forfeited, for which, my infor-

mant added, the judge had been indicted for  
forgery.
