FEDERAL GAZETTE.

SATURDAY, MAY 2.

The Funeral Sermon of the late Mr. THOMAS SUTTON, will be preached to-morrow, the third inst. at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, at the Methodist Meeting-House, Fell's-Point.

The Three Friends, from Baltimore, has arrived at Boston.

The result of the election in Connecticut is, that governor Trumbull, lieutenant-governor Treadwell, and the present secretary and treasurer are re-elected by very large majorities. In the house of representatives we observe that a triumphant majority in favor of the steady habits of the state is again returned. The whole number of representatives is one hundred and ninety-four. Of these 62 are democratic, and 132 federalists.

Remarkable Whirlwind.

On Wednesday last, about three o'clock took place the most tremendous hurricane or Whirlwind ever experienced in this country. At the Fork Meeting-House, called the Methodist Meeting, near the dwelling of Aquila Hall, esq. were swept away seven-teen houses, and several large trees and fences were swept off. In fact, not a single vestige left in that thriving place except the meeting-house and dwelling-house of C. Gorsuch. The hurricane continued its course from thence northerly across the Falls of Ganpowan to Hartford county; and lamentable to tell! the devastation committed in blowing down trees and fences, and entirely destroyed the property of David Lee, Junr. living near the Friends' Meeting House, in said county, &c. [American.]

From a London Paper.

COURT OF KING'S BENCH, Feb. 2. This day being the purification of the Virgin Mary, was a *die non* in term, and of course the judges did not sit as usual; but at nine o'clock this morning, Lord Ellenborough sat at *Nisi Prius*, when several causes were disposed of, among which were the following:

*Littlewood v. Battie.* This was an action for goods sold, and was interesting chiefly with respect to the law as to making bargains.

The plaintiff sold five loads of straw to the defendant at forty shillings per load, amounting to 10l.

Mr. Park, for the plaintiff, proved the delivery, by the straw being brought to the defendant's premises, about two months after the bargain was made; but, to rebut that,

Mr. Garrow, for the defendant proved, that when the straw was brought home, it turned out to be of inferior quality from that which his client had bargained for, and was refused to be taken in. Upon these grounds, he therefore contended, that in point of law, there was no delivery.

Lord Ellenborough observed, that if such a bargain as this was to bind a party, no man could safely venture to treat for any

commodity whatever. By the statute of frauds, where a sale has been made, amounting to 10l. and upwards, there must be one of three things complete, in order to bind the party, a memorandum in writing, a delivery of part of the goods sold, or earnest paid. In this case none of these appeared to have been done, and the plaintiff was accordingly nonsuited.

Communications.

The following anecdote of Lord Chief Justice Holt forms so striking a contrast with recent occurrences in the United States, that I have copied it for your Gazette. Had our Lord High Admiral, as he is termed by one of his "water-closet" heroes, possessed as much regard for the privileges of his fellow-citizens as a British judge, we should not have seen such extraordinary and illegal measures taken to insure the destruction of the power of an ancient rival.

"He had a just sense of the extreme danger of calling in the military power, under the pretence of assisting the civil magistrate in the execution of the laws; and he would on no occasion countenance any thing of the kind. Whilst he held the office of chief justice, a riot happened in Holborn, occasioned by a practice, in which many persons were then engaged, of decoying young people of both sexes to the plantations. The persons decoyed were kept prisoners in a house in that street until an opportunity occurred of shipping them off; which being discovered, the enraged populace were going to pull down the house. Notice of this being sent to Whitehall, a party of the guards were commanded to march to the place, but they first sent an officer to lord chief justice Holt, to acquaint him with the design, and to desire him to send some of his people to attend the soldiers, in order to give more weight to this proceeding. The officer having delivered his message, the chief justice said to him, 'Suppose the populace should not disperse at your appearance, what are you to do then?' 'Sir,' answered the officer, 'we have orders to fire upon them.' 'Have you, sir?' replied his lordship; 'then take notice of what I say: if there be one man killed, and you are tried before I will take care that you, and every soldier of your party, shall be hanged! Sir,' added he, 'go back to those who sent you, and acquaint them, that no officer of mine shall attend soldiers; and let them know at the same time, that the laws of this kingdom are not to be executed by this word: *these matters belong to the civil power, and you have nothing to do with them.*'

"Upon this the lord chief justice ordered his stipendiary, with a few constables, to attend him, and went himself in person to the place where the tumult had arisen, expostulated with the mob, and assured them that justice should be done upon the persons who were the objects of their indignation: upon which they all quietly dispersed."

By Authority.

AN ORDINANCE  
Entitled an ordinance repealing certain ordinances of the mayor and city council of Baltimore.

Whereas the ordinances of this corporation have at the present session of the city council, been revised, collated and amended, and it becomes expedient and necessary that a number of ordinances of said corporation heretofore passed, should be repealed;

Be it therefore enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That all the ordinances passed by this corporation, previous to the present session of the city council, be, and the same are hereby repealed, except as herein after provided, and except the ordinances herein after mentioned, which shall remain and continue in full force, to wit: An ordinance entitled an ordinance, to provide a seal for the city of Baltimore; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to compel the attendance of absent members of the city council; an ordinance entitled an ordinance for the admission and regulation of brokers; an ordinance entitled an ordinance directing the manner of punishing servants and slaves, guilty of offences against the laws and ordinances of the corporation of the city of Baltimore; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to add to the city of Baltimore, part of the precincts lying north of Saratoga-street; an ordinance entitled an ordinance for establishing two streets, and erecting a bridge over Jones's Falls to connect said streets; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to provide for conveying a stream of water and for appropriating a sum of money to defray the expense of the same; an ordinance entitled an ordinance more effectually to diminish the number of dogs in the city of Baltimore; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to regulate party walls and partition fences; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to grant permission to certain persons to extend their lots from Wilkes-street and Bond-street into the water; an ordinance entitled an ordinance for the more equal division of the city of Baltimore into wards; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to regulate the sale of bread; an ordinance entitled an ordinance to regulate the measuring and weighing of grain, flour and meal in the city of Baltimore and for other purposes therein mentioned, except the sixth and seventh sections thereof, which are hereby repealed;

an ordinance entitled an ordinance to compensate Therowgood Smith for such part of his lots on Water-street adjoining the bridge over Jones's Falls as may be encroached upon by said bridge, and for other purposes therein mentioned; an ordinance entitled an ordinance for securing the right of the city of Baltimore in and to the canal cut by Englehard Yeiser and others through a part of the land commonly called Andrew Steigera's Meadows, through which Jones's Falls now passes, and to establish the boundaries thereof; an ordinance entitled an ordinance for the inspection of faxes; an ordinance entitled an ordinance directing returns to be made by the several officers therein mentioned; an ordinance for the regulation of the several markets, within the city of Baltimore; an ordinance entitled an ordinance fixing the salary of the mayor for the ensuing two years; and an ordinance entitled an ordinance to encourage the introduction of water into the city of Baltimore.

And be it enacted and ordained, That nothing herein before contained, shall be construed to deprive this corporation or any person of any rights that may have been secured or acquired, or may hereafter be acquired by any of the said ordinances hereby intended to be repealed, or in virtue of any bond or other obligation heretofore given, or any contract made in conformity to the aforesaid ordinances, or to prevent the recovery of any fines, forfeitures or penalties heretofore incurred under said ordinances, but the said ordinances shall, for the purposes aforesaid, be considered in full force and operation, as if the same had not been repealed.
