TURNPIKES.
Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Western Run, Baltimore county, dated May 4, 1807, to his friend in the city of Baltimore.
I am happy to find that the YORK TURNPIKE ROAD is soon to go into operation; it will be the greatest advantage to us farmers that can possibly happen to our county. Last winter was so severe, and the roads so bad, that with difficulty we got our produce to market; and although we have hay, coal-wood, &c. in abundance, we might as well have had it beyond the mountains, as we could not get it to market; while our neighbors in the Garrettson Forest enjoyed the advantage of a turnpike, and have furnished the town with wood, hay, &c. at great prices, by which they are growing rich, while we are compelled to stay at home, or have our horses, waggon and carts destroyed. We are determined to take as much stock as we can get, as we find the Reisterstown Company have divided Ten per cent. which is laying our money out to great advantage. Besides, we find that the part of Baltimore lying east of Jones's Falls, which was first settled, is far behind the west part of the town, both in population and in buildings—this is for want of a good road. When this road is finished, the waggon will be as plenty from the hay-scalps in Oldtown to Griffith's bridge, as they now are in Howard-street.
Indeed Philip's Hill and Fell's Point, are much interested in the York turnpike road; the produce that will come down that road, must diverge towards the Point, whereas the Frederick and Reister's town turnpike road, will diverge towards the head of the basin. The citizens who hold property to the east of Baltimore, would do well to consider the necessity of aiding this road.
Many object to turnpikes; some from presumption; some through ignorance; and a few have an eye to the next election. It is now no question, whether turnpikes are of advantage or not—we have already two leading to town, which will shortly be completed; and if we do not finish our road, our land will fall in price, and our part of the county will be a wilderness, in comparison with the district so incalculably benefited by other roads.
